PEOPLE OF THE BOOK

As the People of the Book, Jews believe that God's Torah has two sacred components: the Written Torah and the Oral Torah. The Written

Torah is composed of the literal words of the Torah text, and the Oral Torah refers to how these words are taught from one generation to the next. There is no Written Torah without the Oral Torah. It is the transmission Torah from teachers to students and from one generation to the next that infuses our sacred texts with meaning, wisdom, and beauty.

Jews learn from the concept of Oral Torah that a text offers deeper meaning when people read and discuss it together. The narratives of books are more enjoyable and their messages more impactful when the experience is shared with others.

Every few months, a different congregant mentions that he or she would like to see the synagogue have a book club. It seems that there is enough interest among our membership to create a strong book club, and it is time to find out. If you are interested, please contact Joanna in the synagogue office. We will collect names this month and arrange a time for those interested to determine the specific details for the group. This will be a wonderful opportunity to build your relationships to other Adath

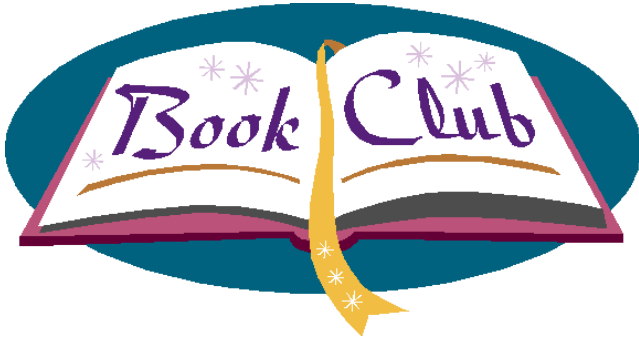
We are working on the next "My House is Your House" event. We anticipate having it by the end of April. More information will be forthcoming.

PARKING BEHIND THE SYNAGOGUE

Lately the parking situation at the synagogue has become an issue with our new neighbors in the old Methodist Church. In the past we have had an agreement that allowed our members to park behind the synagogue when there was nothing going on at the church and vice a versa. That agreement ended when the church property was sold.

Our new neighbors have made it very clear that they do not want anyone but their members parking in their lot at any time. The parking lot directly behind our building is the property of the church and as such we must respect their right to dictate who can and can't park in their lot. This is private property. Past agreements are no longer valid and nobody from

our congregation should be parking in their lot at any time for any reason.

We have clearly marked parking spots behind the Nester Center and along the back wall of the church property. These spots are outlined in yellow and are clearly marked AI. We also have parking in the synagogues lot on William Street. Additional parking can be had in the meters on Old Church Street on Saturday mornings. The city has informed us that no one will be ticketed on Saturday mornings if they are parked in the meters and display a CAI placard available in the synagogue office. Please share this with any guests that might be coming to join you for an event at the synagogue.

Happy Passover Everybody!

Congratulations to all our students on their exciting presentations at the International Seder Experience. Hopefully their hard work and the information they shared will help us all to spice up our seders this year. April is always such a challenging month for religious school. So many Jewish holidays take place, yet we are on break for so much of the month, it is difficult to adequately teach about and observe them all.

One of these days is Yom HaShoah. This year, as in many years, Yom HaShoah falls during the school break. It is unfortunate that this holiday so frequently takes place during school break. However, I do not want it to get lost completely, so we will therefore have special programming with a focus on Holocaust discussion and learning for the middle school students on Wednesday, April 8th to address this very important day of remembrance.

Yom HaZikaron (Israel's Memorial Day) falls on Wednesday, April 22nd. Last year we were fortunate enough to have the Israeli Emissaries come and teach about the meaning of this very serious day in Israel, a country where everybody serves in the military, and so many wars have taken place. While we are sad that they cannot make it again this year, we will again dedicate a portion of the day to remembering Israel's fallen soldiers.

Finally, although Yom HaAtzma'ut (Israel Independence Day) always falls immediately after Yom HaZikaron, quickly transitioning the country from a somber day of remembrance to a joyful day of celebration for our freedom and sovereignty, we do not have school on Thursday, April 23rd. So in the name of education and because we are so proud of our connection to Israel, we will celebrate Yom HaAtzma'ut on Sunday, April 26th.

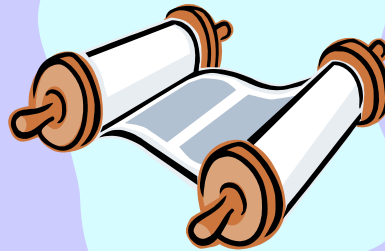

VOLUNTEER RECOGNITION

Our last honoree for this year (2014-15) is a third generation member of Adath Israel. He is named for his grandfather Meyer Yakov who first held prayers in his house in the 1800's before the synagogue was established. Myron Poliner has served on the Board of Directors three times; and as a member and Chairman of the Endowment Committee for at least 30 years. He was instrumental in the creation and management of the Endowment Fund. With the endowment committee, Myron makes sure that the portfolio is balanced in a fiduciary way. Investments are made for growth, income and in support of the state of Israel. He also manages the "calls" on the various holdings within the portfolio to maximize our income. During Myron's leadership, the endowment has grown many times larger, and as a result, the services the synagogue provides to the membership go on undisturbed. His work and that of the endowment committee has meant that annual dues remain considerably lower than they would otherwise be. It is safe to say that without Myron, it is unknown if Adath Israel would be in the great financial state we are in.

Please plan to attend the Volunteer Recognition Brunch on May 31 to honor Myron and the 8 other volunteers that we have recognized throughout the year.

DR. TAL BECKER SPEAKS AT ADATH ISRAEL **JUNE 7, 2015**

Dr. Tal Becker is Principal Deputy Legal Adviser at the Israeli Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and a senior iEngage Project research fellow.

In his current position in government, he is a senior member of the Israeli peace negotiation team and works on the front lines of many of Israel's most pressing diplomatic, legal and policy challenges.



Among numerous positions, Dr. Becker has been a senior fellow at the Washington Institute for Near East Policy, senior policy advisor to Israel's Minister of Foreign Affairs, a lead negotiator in the Annapolis peace talks, director of the international law department at the Israeli Foreign Ministry, counsel to Israel's UN Mission in New York, and an international law expert in the IDF.

He is the author of *Terrorism and the State: Rethinking the Rules of State Responsibility*, which won the Guggenheim Prize for best international law book, and was the Vice-Chairman of the United Nations General Assembly's Legal Committee, the first Israeli to hold a position of such stature in more than 40 years.

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Dr. Becker holds a doctorate from Columbia University, lectures widely throughout Israel and overseas, and is the recipient of numerous scholarly awards.

MILE PROGRAM FOR MONDAY, APRIL 20TH

"Am I My Brother's Keeper?"

On Monday, April 20, 2015 Adath Israel will once again be host to a MILE program (Middlesex Institute for Lifelong Education) related to the Holocaust. Please join us at 1:30 - 3:30 to hear about the moving experiences of two presenters.

Henny Simon, a Holocaust survivor, will recount her family's story as members of the Jewish community in Nazi Germany. Her objective is to teach Americans never to forget what happened during that time so that it will never happen again. She suffered deportation from Hanover, Germany in 1939, liberated from work camps in Poland at the end of the war. She returned to Germany hoping to find family that had survived. Her sad story brought her to Colchester, CT, where she and her first husband bought a chicken / dairy farm. She is a mother, farm owner, historian, author and educator. Since 1986 Henny has been speaking at schools and other groups about her life before, during and after the Holocaust.

Ben Cooper, a WWII veteran, was in the American forces called to liberate those who survived the horrors and atrocities of the Nazis. He served as a combat medic in France and Germany, taking part in the liberation of Dachau Concentration Camp with his outfit. Since 1990 he has been speaking to high school and college students as well as civic groups.

Looking forward to sharing what is sure to be a memorable afternoon.

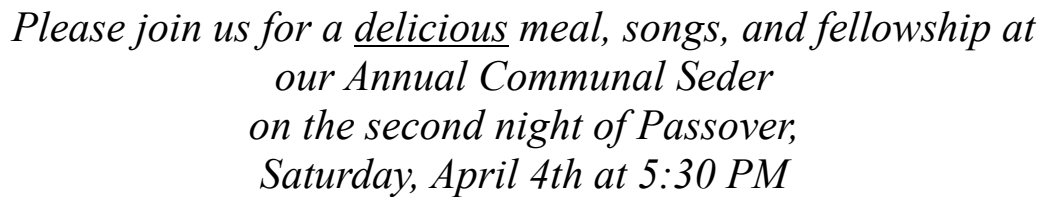

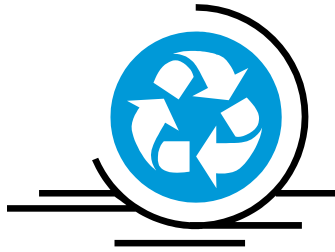
