GARDEN OF DREAMS

While the institution of Tu B'Shevat was initially created for purposes of taxation, it has become essentially a Jewish Arbor Day. This

year, we celebrate the holiday of Tu B'Shevat, which translates to the 15th of [the Hebrew month of] Shevat on February 3. The significance of trees is mentioned several times in the Torah, and rabbinic literature teaches us that our relationship to trees is central to our relationship to other people and to God. The following narrative, as told by Storyteller Peninnah Schram, is adapted from Tractate Taanit of the Babylonian Talmud:

Honi the Wise One was also known as Honi the Circle Maker. By drawing a circle and stepping inside of it, he would recite special prayers for rain, sometimes even argue with God during a drought, and the rains would come. He was, indeed, a miracle maker. As wise as he was, Honi sometimes saw something that puzzled him. Then he would ask questions so he could unravel the mystery.

One day, Honi the Circle Maker was walking on the road and saw a man planting a carob tree. Honi asked the man, "How long will it take for this tree to bear fruit?"

The man replied, "Seventy years."

Honi then asked the man, "And do you think you will live another seventy years and eat the fruit of this tree?"

The man answered, "Perhaps not. However, when I was born into this world, I found many carob trees planted by my father and grandfather. Just as they planted trees for me, I am planting trees for my children and grandchildren so they will be able to eat the fruit of these trees."

This story about Honi resonates in the hearts of Jews because we are sensitive to the mimetic transmission of our history and values. We are grateful for the blessings that our ancestors have bequeathed to us and we are responsible to pass those blessings onto our descendants. The sentiments of gratitude and responsibility are captured in the Hebrew phrase *midor* lador - from generation to generation. Because we live as witnesses to and beneficiaries of the modern State of Israel, the imperative of midor lador rests uniquely upon our shoulders. Our ancestors dreamed of living in a world with a Jewish homeland, and, thanks to their perseverance, determination, and creativity, we are living in their dream. We have a responsibility of transmission that rivals our ancestors who stood at the foot of Mount Sinai.

As we experience the miracle of the modern State of Israel, we recognize the miracle to be not just the founding of the State of Israel but the accomplishments of its people. David Ben-Gurion, Israel's first Prime Minister, shared his dream that the Jewish people would make the desert bloom, and his dream has come to fruition through Israel's accomplishments at home and its global contributions to the fields of medicine, technology, the arts, humanitarian aid, and the environment. And, quite literally, Israel has made the desert bloom by transforming arid land into fertile land and sharing the cutting edge achievements in ir-

rigation and agriculture with other countries around the world.

We live in the dream, but we are also the stewards of the dream. The holiday of Tu B'Shevat offers us an opportunity to express our gratitude and our responsibility by directing our attention to trees in Israel. Among its many attempts to preserve and strengthen Israel, the Jewish National Fund (JNF) invites people to plant trees in Israel to make the desert bloom, literally and metaphorically. Through JNF, Adath Israel has recently reserved its first garden in Israel which has space for 100 trees. I hope that you will help us to fill our garden by dedicating trees in honor of family and friends to decorate special moments in their lives and connect your loved ones, in those moments, to our sacred homeland in Israel. A \$5 donation sent into the synagogue office dedicates a single tree in our Adath Israel garden and makes you a builder of Israel – one who plants the seeds for the future of the Jewish people. We are living in an incredibly special time in the history of the Jewish people, but there is no guarantee that we will be able to maintain our homeland and witness Israel as a beacon of light unto the world. The only guarantee of which we can be certain is that without your steady love and support, our grandchildren and great grandchildren will not experience the dream in which we have lived for the past sixty-five years. The dream of Israel is one dream from which we do not ever want to wake.

Dr. Michael Good will talk about his book *The Search For Major Plagge: The Nazi Who Saved Jews*, published by Fordham University Press in 2006. Dr. Good is the son of two Holocaust survivors from Vilna, Lithuania. He tells the story of how Karl Plagge, a German army officer, saved his mother and more than 250 other Jews.

When *The Search for Major Plagge* was published, the world finally learned about a unique hero—and about one American doctor's extraordinary journey to tell Karl Plagge's story. Michael Good's book is the story of the German commander of a Lithuanian work camp who saved hundreds of Jewish lives in the Vilna ghetto —including the life of Good's mother, Pearl. Who was this enigmatic officer Pearl Good had spoken of so often?

After five years of research—interviewing survivors, assembling a team that could work to open German files untouched for fifty years, following every lead he could, Good was able to uncover the amazing tale of one man's remarkable courage.

Michael Good has appeared on C-SPAN, as a speaker in Israel and Germany, and in schools, libraries, churches, and synagogues across the United States. Good, a physician, continues

to follow and develop the Plagge story from his home in Durham, CT.




