







Torah Wahnon Ferrebee - <u>Jewish Homeland</u>

It is very important for Jewish people to have a homeland (Israel) because a lot of bad things would happen if there was none.

One reason that it is so important for Jewish people to have homeland is because they need a place that they are always welcome to come to. In World War II there was no Jewish homeland and places like America did not allow any Jews to come in. However if the Jews had Israel at the time then they could go there.

Another reason that there needs to be a Jewish homeland is because of persecution. Jewish people get persecuted very often so now that we have Israel the Jews have a permanent homeland. According to the right of return in Israel any person that has Jewish grandparents have the right to go to Israel at any time they would like and become citizens. That is proof that Israel helps Jews at all time and is a very good homeland for the Jews

Not only is it important that Jewish people had a homeland it is also important that Israel was the homeland. It was important that this was the homeland because to Jews Israel is very holy. One reason that Israel was holy is because the holy temple is in Israel. Another reason that Israel became the homeland is because the Jewish people fought very hard in multiple wars to win it.

In confirmation class this year, we have been studying the history of what now is Israel, from it being Canaan to Palestine to being fought over and then becoming Israel. We have also been finding out the importance of having a Jewish homeland, and I have come up with three reasons why it would be important. First, protection; next, it has spiritual meaning; and lastly, it connects Jews all over the world at a common place.

If there were anything ever again to happen like the Holocaust, or a time when Jews were being persecuted, a Jewish homeland would protect them. In its first years, Israel experienced many wars against

neighboring hostile Arab countries, so they quickly developed a good defense system. This will be very important if we ever need a safe place to go again, one reason why it is vital for Israel to exist.

Because of the times when five countries attacked at once (The Israeli War of Independence), because of the Suez Campaign, Six Day War, Yom Kippur War, and Operation Peace for Galilee, Israel has a strong defense system. This will be very important if we ever need a safe place to go again, one reason why it is vital for Israel to exist.

Another reason is that the land where Israel is has deep spiritual meaning to many Jews, because it was first where Abraham went to "become" Jewish, it has the Western Wall, it's where the Jewish people went after leaving Egypt. Its history, involving the fighting mentioned above, is important to many people. Making an alliyah to Israel is of great significance to almost all Jews, including me, as Jerusalem is considered the holiest place in the world for Judaism. It makes for a special place to go on vacation, have a bat-mitzvah (or bar-mitzvah), or do some sight-seeing.

The third reason we need a Jewish homeland is because it connects all Jews, no matter where they live. They know that if they go to Israel, there will be Jews, people who will accept them knowing nothing about them except that they are Jewish. When Israel was first formed, it accepted Jews from anywhere in the world so long as they have a Jewish grandparent, parent, or they are Jewish. It was doing that to build up its population, and they still give a Jew citizenship even if said Jew has never been to Israel before.

Jews need a homeland, a place to go in times of need; a holy place to go which was the beginning of Judaism; a place to go that brings together people all over the world based only on the fact that they believe in one God and our laws. It clearly is very important to have a Jewish homeland, and we all should be happy that it exists even after all the battering it took in its early years.

Grace Poliner—Confirmation Paper

I have to confess that I didn't have to think very hard to come up with multiple arguments for the significance of a Jewish homeland. I've learned a lot about this in Hebrew school and also at home. Israel, is, in my opinion, something that all Jews should be informed about, and be able to discuss. I believe it boils down to three main points: security for all Jewish people, biblical and historical significance for the Jewish religion, and as a showcase for Jewish values, strengths, and unique abilities.

Before Israel was established in 1948 the Jewish people never truly had a place where they were safe. Historically Jews have been persecuted across the world. During my grandparents young life European Jews flocked to Israel. When my parents were younger it was Russian and Ethiopian Jews and now we hear stories of French Jews fleeing persecution with their own country to find peace and security in Israel. There, they find not only refuge but the freedom to live a Jewish life. In doing so the state of Israel protects not only the individuals security but protects the Jewish religion itself from being terminated by enemies.

Israel has great significance historically and biblically as well. First of all the land was promised by God and therefore has innate holiness and significance. The places and relics found there provide physical evidence of the passages of the Torah. It is a unique place where you can go and visualize the Torah, and make it come alive. Because Israel is a place where Jews are free to be Jewish, it has become a place where they gather. This, I think it strengthens a person's connection to religion while also creating a stronger sense of global Judaism.

This holy place and refuge which the Jews have created for themselves also become a place where they can

This holy place and refuge which the Jews have created for themselves also become a place where they can showcase their unique strengths and values. The Israeli military is one of the most feared and respected in the world. The agriculture and environmental practices lead the globe and their medical system is one of the best in the world. Just like in the Torah, the Jews have been able to recover gracefully from past conflicts. Israel's government also reflects Jewish values by providing aid to other countries, like Egypt, during a crisis. In this way, Israel shows the world our strength and compassion.

The Jewish cry in response to the holocaust was "never again". Now that Israel has been created never will happen again. Jews will never be turned away from another country when looking for protection because we are independent and have the ability to protect ourselves. In fact any individual with Jewish ancestry and their spouses are permitted through Israel's right of return. Permitted to live a safe, happy, and productive Jewish life.

Finally, I would like to say thank you to multiple people who have helped me achieve this. So thank you to my class and Hebrew school friends and teachers for always keeping learning fun. Thank you Grae for helping me understand Israel on a higher level. Thank you Rabbi Haaz for always helping us go above and beyond. Thank you to my grandparents for instilling a strong sense of Judaism in me. Thank you to the community for always having my back and supporting me. Thank you to my dad for pushing me to do my best and thank you to my mom for helping me not only on my paper but on everything.


