# SPEAK UP FOR ISRAEL

As you approach the High Holy Days this year and examine the different aspects of your yourself, you should recognize that Israel is a part

of your identity. And, as you have certainly seen this summer, Israel is under attack. Israel is besieged by rockets, by media coverage, and by Jewish apathy. Israel has responded to the rockets with military prowess and concern for human life. After a recent visit to Israel, General James T. Conway, who was the 34<sup>th</sup> commandant of the U.S. Marine Corps, commented, "[Hamas's] cynical inducement of civilian suffering for propaganda is in marked contrast to the IDF's treatment of noncombatants." After General Conway argues that Israel unquestionably holds the moral high ground, he concludes his article, "...it is essential for the IDF to be as vigilant in shaping the information environment as it is in intercepting rockets from Gaza." General Conway's defense of Israel is refreshing in light of the anti-Israel attacks that flow out of the pens of journalists and the mouths of reporters and foreign leaders. However, General Conway, as an American military leader, places the burden of defense entirely on Israel. He does not feel a personal connection with the land or

with the people of Israel. We, Adath Israel (the community of Israel), should feel differently.

Just before the conclusion of the Book of Numbers, God prepares the people to enter into the Land of Israel. While the land is being divided, the tribes of Reuven and Gad and half of the tribe of Manasseh request to remain beyond the border of the Jordan – outside of the Land of Israel. Moses is initially appalled at this request but eventually concedes. The tribes may live and raise their livestock beyond the Jordan, but, before they do, they must fight alongside the other tribes to help secure the Land of Israel. This is a poignant message in light of the attacks against Israel. You may live outside of Israel, but you may not sit idly by while your fellow Jews are at war.

You may not fight alongside the IDF as it intercepts rockets from Gaza and attempts to dismantle the destructive capabilities of Hamas, but you are not free to watch as an observer from your sofa. General Conway mentioned that there is a simultaneous war over the "information environment," and you can help advance Israel on this front. Talk about Israel with with family, friends, and strangers. Tell them that you are a Jew and you value human life above all else. Tell them how proud you are of Israel for considering not only the welfare of its own citizens but the welfare of the citizens of Gaza. Tell them how Israel delivers food, electricity, natural gas, and fuel to the people of Gaza even as Hamas fires rockets into Israel, and tell them how the IDF sends text messages and drops leaflets and other objects to warn of impending attacks and to offer safe corridors to travel. Unlike General Conway, you have skin in the game when it comes to Israel. Do not leave your brothers and sisters to fight alone for your homeland. Now is the time to add your voice to the conversation. Speak up for your home, speak up for your family, and speak up for yourself. May the new year of 5775 bring a step toward peace in Israel and in countries throughout the world, and may it be a year in which your voice helps to shape peoples' attitudes toward Jews and toward our homeland. Shana tova umtuka – a good and sweet new year to you and your family.

# The School Page for Elul & Tishrei 5774-75 September 2014



As I write this column in the middle of July with the backdrop of a war between Israel and Gaza and from the perspective of being in Italy, the nexus between the past and the present come to light. I have been spending time taking my children to learn about some of the oldest Jewish communities of the diaspora (including Rome, which is the oldest). During this time the importance of understanding the Jewish people, our history and the significance of Israel becomes crystal clear. It falls upon the shoulders of our religious school to teach our students about where they come from, how we got here, and how they need to be involved in the future.

The Jewish people have a history of connection that is based on community, culture, education, and prayer traditions. We as a people are amongst the oldest religious traditions of the world, once a great power, and considered a formidable foe, we fought wars side by side, took on some of the strongest empires, and managed to survive thousands of years in the diaspora. Countless other civilizations disappeared from the map completely, the Etruscans, the Phoenicians, and the Carthaginians to name a few. Why not the Jews?

Even after the fall of the 2<sup>nd</sup> temple, and being pushed out of our traditional homeland, the Jewish people remained faithful and strong in their practices and values. Much of the religion as we know it today was developed in the diaspora, including the Jewish calendar and much of the writings found in the Mishna and Talmud. How is it that Judaism fared so well? The simple answer is Jewish identity. The traditions and values of the Jews set them apart from others, and the Jews even created their own Jewish Quarter in Rome long before the introduction of the mandated ghetto. The community was strong and active, and even in the diaspora was able to flourish.

Although this remained true for some time, the tides turned, and eventually the Jews began to have problems in their diaspora societies. These issues resulted in the mass exodus of Jews from Spain and Portugal due to the inquisition (around 1450 CE), and the beginnings of the Ghettos in other Western European countries (around 1500 CE) and the Pogroms in Central and Eastern Europe (around 1800 CE). These troubles helped to bring about the birth of modern Zionism. Although a divisive issue, for many Jews, the need for the creation of a Jewish State became obvious over time.

Today, we are very fortunate, Jews live freely and feel safe in most parts of the world. Since the creation of the state of Israel, Jews have a safe haven and a confidence that they always have a place to call home. As our home, Israel is a place that we need to understand, connect to, support, and feel proud of. Our students need to understand the trail of Jewish history and the traditions that bond us together, and how the creation of the state of Israel changed our past, present and future for the better.



- **1. Please Note:** During High Holy Day Services Rabbi Seth Haaz's sermons will be at the beginning of the Torah Service.
- <u>2. Shabbat Services</u> –Friday night and Saturday morning services will be held at their usual times: 7:00 PM and 9:30 AM, respectively.
- <u>3. S'lichot Service</u> Please join us for *S'lichot*, a time of spiritual preparations for the High Holy Days. We will reacquaint ourselves with melodies and prayers of the holy days to come and begin to focus on *t'shuvah*, *t'fillah* and *tz'dakah* (repentance, prayer and charity). Please call the synagogue office in advance to request child care.
- 4.Youth & Family Services Services for Grades 4 through 7 will be held in the Small Sanctuary on **both days** of Rosh Hashanah at 10:00 AM and on Yom Kippur at 10:30 AM. Family services for students in Kindergarten-Grade 3 will be held in the Yellow Room of the Religious School at 10:30 AM on Rosh Hashanah and 11:00 AM on Yom Kippur. Mazal Tot family services (infants PreK with an adult) will meet in the Orange Room of the Religious School at 10:30 AM on Rosh Hashanah and 11:00 AM on Yom Kippur.

Educational Child Care Child care will be provided for infants, toddlers and children second grade and under in the Religious School's Purple Room both days of Rosh Hashanah and on Yom Kippur for those who have pre-registered. 


## **ANNUAL GIVING CAMPAIGN**

## **HOST AN ONEG OR A KIDDUSH**

Take advantage of an opportunity to share a family simcha, honor a friend or relative, or remember a loved one by sponsoring a Friday night Oneg Shabbat or a Saturday morning Kiddush. This is a delightful way to let others in our community celebrate a special occasion or share a memory with you. You can host an Oneg or Kiddush even if you may not be able to attend, although your presence would certainly add to the occasion.

The following is a breakdown of the cost for a Saturday morning Kiddush and what foods are normally provided:

**Regular Kiddush - \$72** – Challah, gefilte fish, horseradish, herring(s), tuna fish, egg salad, assorted sweets, bagels, cream cheese, wine, juice, coffee/tea.

**Deluxe - \$136** – all of the regular Kiddush plus lox and white fish, flavored cream cheeses, tomatoes, onions and fruit.

Cost for a regular Friday night Oneg Shabbat is approximately \$ 54, with additional costs for life cycle occasions.

These prices are based on normal attendance at minyan (approximately 20 attendees).

Prices will be adjusted if more are expected to attend Kiddush or Oneg or for special occasions (Bar/Bat Mitzvah, baby naming, or other life cycle events).

Call the synagogue office at 346-4709 at least a month in advance to make arrangements with the synagogue office administrator. You may either purchase the food and bring it to the synagogue according to her instructions or simply make a donation and have our staff prepare the refreshments on your behalf.
