HAVING THE RIGHT TOOLS

For the past three years, I have made it a priority to include a Jewish folktale from the genre of "God de-

sires the heart" on Kol Nidrei, our most sacred moment of the year. The message of each dramatic telling is that God is less concerned with the words on the pages of our prayer books than with our deepest convictions and most sincere intentions. God desires the heart. While I believe this is true. I also believe that the formal liturgy encompassed in Jewish prayer services is an incredible, and a necessary, tool to achieving true expression of the heart. We are part of an inherited tradition, and we derive profound meaning from the prayers with which our ancestors struggled and loved and to which they looked for support. Every Jewish person, regardless of observance or synagogue attendance knows the power of fixed liturgical prayer intuitively, although many of us ignore its power. However, there is beauty in coming to synagogue and reciting Mourner's Kaddish for a family member; there is comfort in reciting a Mishebeirakh prayer for healing for a loved one; it is difficult to express in words the feeling of singing the Shema by the bedside of one who is dying. Each experience is enhanced by having formal liturgical

prayers, fixed words from our tradition, to utter at the right moment. The formal prayers chanted in the synagogue, at home, out in nature, or by the hospital bedside are not anchors to keep us fixed to the ground but wings to bring our hearts to flight.

The great deal of study and participation needed to access the layers of meaning in every Jewish prayer can be a daunting barrier to the casual or High Holy Day prayer attendee, especially when combined with an unfamiliarity with Hebrew and a long prayer service. Many in our Adath Israel community feel these barriers to meaningful prayer despite our best efforts to be welcoming and engaging. It is almost impossible to chisel through the layers of meaning that underscore every word in our prayer services without the right tools. Our current High Holy Day prayer book, which was at one time the flagship mahzor of the Conservative Movement, does not fit the needs of our present, diverse community. It offers little transliteration (Hebrew words written in English letters) and, in some cases, lacks English altogether. Those who wish to pray in English must turn to different pages than those who wish to follow in Hebrew, and the prayers that they find are not equivalent. The language is gendered, the colors make it difficult to read, and there are no explanations about the meaning of the prayers. You may have found any one of these to be a barrier to your prayer and your comfort in our High Holy Day services.

Fortunately, there is a new flagship mahzor of the Conservative Movement much more in sync with the modern Jewish community in America. This High Holy Day prayer book is called "Mahzor Lev Shalem" and, as a testament to its popularity with American Jews and synagogues, has sold over 250,000 copies over the past few years since its printing. Lev Shalem means "a full heart," and this prayer book is the proper tool with which we can mine the deepest places within. It includes contemporary language to appeal to our members and guests, and it offers transliteration to encourage wide participation. It also includes a broad range of literature from rabbinic to modern poetry to help capture and experience the meaning of the prayers and fill in much of the background knowledge needed to access our rich tradition. Mahzor Lev Shalem is the best tool available now for High Holy Day prayer, and all synagogues serious about offering those who attend a meaningful experience on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are moving toward it. 250,000 of these books have found

their way into synagogues and homes across America, and it is time for Adath Israel to be a part of this move toward meaningful and inspirational prayer. We owe it to you, our members and guests.

Our Ritual Committee has decided to make Mahzor Lev Shalem a priority for the coming High Holy Days and looks forward to the support of our community in purchasing and dedicating these books. To get a sense of the benefits and advantages of Mahzor Lev Shalem, please join us for Friday night services where, beginning in mid-March, we will be switching from our current Shabbat evening prayer book to a beta-test version of Siddur Lev Shalem called First Fruits. The layout and additions to this Shabbat and Festival prayer book echo the changes that made Mahzor Lev Shalem such a valuable and appreciated tool. This is an exciting opportunity for our prayer community at Adath Israel, and I am grateful for the time and effort that the members of our ritual committee will invest in bringing about this momentous shift in the prayer life of our synagogue. Please help them to transform the sacred time that we share on the High Holy Days. With your enthusiasm and support, we will share a very special Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur together this fall.

*Below is a blurb from the Mahzor Lev Shalem website:

Lev Shalem seeks to embrace the diverse backgrounds and expectations in each of our communities and open doors for every congregant. For the congregant who is familiar with the *t'fillah*, the mahzor's running commentary presents both a historical overview and insight into the meaning of prayers. For the congregant who doesn't know Hebrew, the English translations are close to the meaning of the original and the transliterations are plentiful. For the seeker who comes to services looking for meaning and direction, the mahzor's rich assortment of readings includes classic piyyutim that appear in Conservative publications for the first time; Hasidic stories and reflections; and quotes from Abraham Joshua Heschel, Martin Buber, contemporary Israeli and American poets, and leading rabbis in the Conservative movement and beyond. And with abundant readings that focus on spirtikkun olam. issues and Mahzor Lev Shalem speaks to the contemporary concerns of our congregants. The book represents the best of the Conservative movement—the classical and the contemporary, the historical and the spiritual; it promises to be inspiring and relevant for years to come.

Our next honoree came to Middletown when he was one year old. He has a deep connection to and love of Middletown and the synagogue. He and his family still sit in the original "family seats" for the High Holidays. Stan was President of the synagogue from 2003-2005. During his term, Adath Israel celebrated its 100th anniversary with a dinner-dance. There were 252 members and 73 students in the religious school. Rabbi Reimer escorted a group to Israel. As we so frequently hear, contributions decreased while expenses increased. Dues had to be raised except for single senior membership and out of state members. Discussions were held regarding the use of the main sanctuary for funerals. Parking issues continued----an oh-so-familiar discussion. And inquiries were made to purchase the adjacent Didato property. Many of the house repairs were funded by the endowment funds. These repairs included the replacement of the oil tank and some asbestos removal.

But since then Stan continues to be a very active participant on numerous committees. Need more seats or looking to change your seats for the High Holidays? Talk to Stan. He has served as co-chair of the seating and ushering committee. Need more raffle tickets for the upcoming fund raisers? Speak to Stan. He has served on the fund raising committee for numerous years. Shortly there will be a dedication for the new impressive permanent Holocaust Memorial. Stan planned an integral role on that as well.

JTS Announces New Phase of Major Multi-Year Reinvestment in Morningside Heights Campus

Newly Closed Sale Offers Opportunity for Redesign Focused on Students and Community

February 1, 2016 (New York) — The Jewish Theological Seminary (JTS), one of the leading Jewish institutions in North America, today took a major step to redesign its storied and historic campus in Morningside Heights, New York. JTS completed the sale of a defined lot of land at the eastern edge of its campus at 3080 Broadway, limited rights to develop that land, and one of its off-campus residence halls to Savanna, a New York-based real estate investment and development firm. The proceeds from this sale will enable JTS to reimagine and modernize its campus to meet the needs of current and future generations. JTS has retained the services of Tod Williams and Billie Tsien, world renowned architects and National Medal of Arts award recipients, whose work can be found at Lincoln Center in New York, the Barnes Foundation in Philadelphia, University of Pennsylvania, Princeton University and elsewhere.

"For 130 years, JTS has been the leading training ground for the next generation of Jewish leaders in North America and beyond. Today, we're reimagining our campus to meet the needs of current and future students and the broader Jewish community," said **Arnold Eisen, chancellor of JTS**. "We will use advanced technology and design to strengthen our academic institution at a time of rapid and radical transformation. Our new campus will facilitate a deeper collaboration with our neighbors, our city, and with individuals and communities around the world. It will provide multiple new opportunities for dialogue around the most critical issues of our time. This is the beginning of a new chapter in our long history as a world class educational institution, dedicated to training the leaders of tomorrow."

The redevelopment of JTS will include: a new library to hold its unparalleled collection of Judaica treasures, a state of the art residence hall, improved conference facilities, and an auditorium/performing arts space with advanced technological capacity. Together, these facilities will enable JTS to provide a 21st century education for its students and to project its vision and teaching throughout North America and the world.

"We are thrilled to take on this most important and challenging project for JTS," said **Tod Williams and Billie Tsien**. "This new building will help the campus to engage the world, honoring the institution's past and celebrating what is to come. As architects our task is to create a vessel that will change the lives of those who experience it and ultimately make life itself more meaningful. We are very excited and honored to be working with the board, administration, faculty and staff at JTS towards this common goal."

"JTS has always been an idea incubator, exploring the ways that Judaism can be exciting and responsive to our times. As chairman of the board, I am gratified to be at the helm during such a transformational moment in the organization's history," said **Alan Levine**, **chair of the board of trustees of JTS**. "The sale announced today will enable us to reimagine our campus and fulfill our mission to cultivate leaders who think in new and interesting ways about Judaism and the broader world."

Savanna has hired Beyer Blinder Belle Architects, recognized for its stewardship of historic buildings in sensitive urban sites, to design a 250,000-sq.ft. residential development for the site on 122nd Street between Amsterdam Avenue and Broadway. Savanna has over two decades of experience investing in and developing properties throughout New York City.





NEW MENU, COSTS, AND PROCEDURES FOR SPONSORED KIDDUSH
