

CHERVA KADISHA


The Chevra Kadisha is seeking a new Chairperson to manage the Cemetery on Pine Street. One can serve as Chair and not participate in the Ritual of Taharah. The Chair needs to be available to communicate with our cemetery service and the involved funeral home for the preparation of the gravesite. These tasks occur from the time of our receiving notice of a death to the completion of the burial.

The Chevra Kadisha is also in need of newer volunteers, men and women, to insure that the congregation can continue to provide for our members at the end of life. When invited to volunteer, most often people express their aversion to the idea of handling a deceased individual. Many who expressed initial hesitation found that the experience was not as expected but a gentle act of caring for a congregant of our synagogue.

Please also note: The finances of the synagogue and the cemetery are separate entities by law. There is no line in the synagogue budget that is related to the cemetery, its management or care. That all comes from donations directed to the Chevra Kadisha and on the limited annual earnings of a very small endowment. Please consider an annual directed donation to the Chevra Kadisha as part of your plan for giving and consider the funding needs of the cemetery in your estate planning.



The hospital chaplain will make a referral to the Department of Spiritual Care which will contact the synagogue. If you do not wish to go through the hospital, please contact the synagogue directly if you or a loved one would like a pastoral visit.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NEWS

What a wonderful start to a new year. As always, the school is a lively place to be on Wednesday afternoons and Sunday mornings. On Wednesdays students in grades 3-6 begin with a healthy snack and then move right into Hebrew where we hone our decoding skills and work on T'filah and modern Hebrew too. A highlight is watching SpongeBob in Hebrew and looking for words we know by reading the subtitles! Because we have a small teacher to student ratio, we are able to be sure that Hebrew learning is highly individualized, based on each student's level.

Sundays we welcome our youngest Mazel Tots, our first and second graders and our Madrichim - who have already become Our youngest students are b'nai mitzvah. introduced to Hebrew, prayer, holidays, and so much more through song, art, food, movies, games and stories. Our oldest students are involved in a combination on doing, learning and teaching. They are in the process of creating a comfy and user-friendly library space, thinking about contemporary issues through a Jewish lens and acting as leaders, mentors and role models during our community art time at the end of our day.

In addition to ongoing music program, access to technology and individualized support of students who need some extra help, this year we have introduced a few new initiatives. Every Sunday we community art program, where students come together to create projects to highlight a holiday or parsha. We are looking forward to creating special projects for Chanukah, We have also started Havdalah and more. working with a new Hebrew program in which students earn different colored bead necklaces as they progress through the levels. Students are excited and motivated to move up every few weeks.

A special feeling exists in the school and we encourage congregants to stop by, get involved and share your talents with us.

Prices for both a Kiddush and/or an Oneg Shabbat will be adjusted if there is a larger group in attendance for special life cycle events (Bar/Bat Mitzvah, baby naming, or wedding, etc.).

Of course, you can always purchase the food, bring it to the synagogue and do the set up yourself while also following the synagogue's Kashrut guidelines. Some assistance may be available on the day of your Kiddush.
