OPENING DOORS

It is hard to believe we are turning the corner from 2018 to 2019. As we turn the chapter on 2018, 2019 promises to be an eventful and exciting year

for Congregation Adath Israel. Our search for a new rabbi is well underway. Your feedback in response to the synagogue survey issued during the high holidays was insightful, and has served as a guide in our search. By the time you read this, we will have visits planned for our rabbinical candidates. Please keep your eyes and ears open as we hope you all take the opportunity to meet the candidates as your continued involvement is vital.

In addition to the rabbi search, our talks with Meriden continue to move forward. We also continue to work on new safety and security measures for the synagogue in the aftermath of the Tree of Life tragedy. I have to admit, I am having a hard time getting used to the locked doors at the synagogue. While it is an appropriate safeguard, it is counterintuitive to other things we need to do to ensure our vitality and our purpose.

The synagogue, like any place of worship, should be an open place where anyone in need of prayer, spiritual healing or community can come to seek solace. We should be open to member and non-member alike to serve this purpose. A locked door, while needed, does not send as welcoming a message.

But we can make up for the physical locking

of our doors, by unlocking our doors in other ways. After the Tree of Life tragedy, our community came together as we opened our doors to the Greater Middletown community for Pray, Eat, Sing. We were blessed to be joined by many Jews and non-Jews. We opened our synagogue doors again for our annual Chanukah candle-lighting celebration, and again our community responded by joining us at the synagogue.

Sociologist Robert Putnam popularized the theory that there was a decline in social capital which resulted in negative consequences for our society. He pointed to the decline in membership in traditional civic, social and fraternal organizations as evidence in support of this decline. Putnam makes a distinction between two types of social capital: bonding capital and bridging capital. Bonding capital occurs when you socialize with people like you. Bridging capital occurs when you socialize with people who are not like you.

With social media, it is easier than ever to isolate yourself from others, and focus on those who share your views, all but ignoring bridging capital. In order to create a peaceful society, we need to have bridging capital. It is easy to insult someone when you can do it through the lens of social media, and you do not have to engage with someone directly. By opening our doors, we can invest in bridging capital which will make our community open and welcoming to all—and stronger in the end.

So as we start 2019, let's remember that while we might be closing one door in our synagogue, let us take the time to make sure we open other doors—to Jews and non-Jews alike—so that we foster a healthy and welcoming community.

Rabbi Earl Kideckel Sunday, January 6 * 9 a.m. Monday, January 7 * 8 a.m.

Rabbi Earl Kideckel is a native of Toronto. His family was quite active in the Jewish community and in synagogue life. He attended the Associated Hebrew Day Schools and the Community Hebrew Academy of Toronto. He continued his studies at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America and Columbia University, where he earned bachelor degrees from both institutions, a master's degree and rabbinic ordination. In 2010, JTS bestowed upon the rabbi an honorary doctorate for his studies and work in the community. In 1988, he completed his course work in advanced pastoral counseling from the Blanton-Peale Institute for Religions and Health.

During his career Rabbi Kideckel has served congregations in Long Island, NY, Las Vegas and Boston. He has been involved in the community as a pastoral counselor and hospital chaplain, served as an ethicist for the Department of Health and Human Services in a local hospital, and is a past president of the New England Region of the Rabbinical Assembly. In his last congregation, Rabbi Kideckel was extremely involved in creatively shaping, developing and evolving its culture and community. Throughout his career Rabbi Kideckel has been involved in interfaith dialogue and programming.

Today, Rabbi Kideckel serves the unaffiliated in the Boston area, as a teacher, counselor, and officiant at lifecycle events. Rabbi Kideckel's wife, Lisa, leads an early education center. They are loving parents to three adult children and a wonderful daughter-in-law.

Rabbi Eve Eichenholtz grew up on Long Island and is a product of the Conservative Movement. As a student she attended synagogue Hebrew schools, Camp Ramah, Solomon Schechter Day School. Rabbi Eichenholtz holds a B.A. in Economics from Barnard College and a B.A. in Bible from the Jewish Theological Seminary, where she began rabbinical school. After transferring, she was ordained in 2013 by the Academy for Jewish Religion New York.

The rabbinate has brought Rabbi Eichenholtz to communities across the United States and as far away as Israel. She has served diverse congregations, specializing in small and mid-sized synagogues, where she prides herself on knowing everyone's names and stories.

When leading services, Rabbi Eichenholtz brings in her love of song, story, teaching and theater, combined with energy and enthusiasm. As a teacher, she strives to find the unique threads within Judaism which will capture each learner's attention. Rabbi Eichenholtz greatly enjoys facilitating personal reflection, individual support, and communal growth, through her work.

In addition to her pursuits within the Jewish community, Rabbi Eichenholtz actively and passionately cultivates relationships with other faith-based groups. She serves as an adjunct chaplain at a local university and a volunteer chaplain with the hospital and police department.

In her time off, Rabbi Eichenholtz enjoys cooking, theater and all things ice-hockey.

Rabbi Eichenholtz can't wait to lead services again at Adath Israel and looks forward to connecting and reconnecting with everyone.

RABBI SEARCH COMMITTEE

Some of you may remember Rabbi Eichenholtz as she served as a student intern here from 2008-2009, when she was studying at the Jewish Theological Seminary. We will have our pray-eat-sing service and dinner on that Friday night, a congregational Shabbat lunch on Saturday, and breakfast after Sunday's minyan in the hopes that all will have a chance to meet Rabbi Eichenholtz.





Job Description- Takes about a 2 month a year commitment (present chair to assist for to ease into the position):


- Coordinate with the American Red Cross dates of drive (usually 2x/year on Tuesdays)






