We are moving forward with planning in the expectation that this will happen. The best way to ensure a smooth transition is to have as much advance planning as possible so we jointly decide how to incorporate elements of Temple B'Nai Abraham into our Congregation, and how we can be one from the start. Like us, Temple B'Nai Abraham has an incredible commitment to its members and to Judaism.

This is an exciting time for our Congregation. As I said in my last column, we have opened our doors to the greater community in the last several months in order to foster a healthy and welcoming community. As we open our doors to Temple B'Nai Abraham, please make sure you are there to greet them at the door, and make them feel at home at Congregation Adath Israel just as they feel at home at Temple B'Nai Abraham.

# Thumim Scholarship Funded by Mark and Luanne Paley An Investment in our Jewish Future


