November 7th - Wesleyan - Zeruya Shalev, an Israeli best seller novelist, will talk about her newest, powerful and astute novel *Pain*.

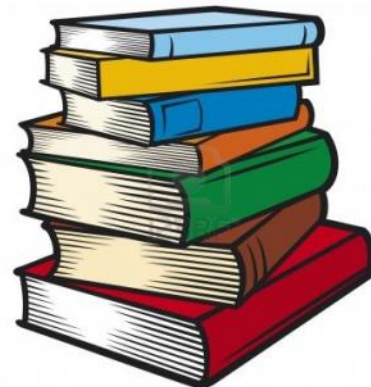

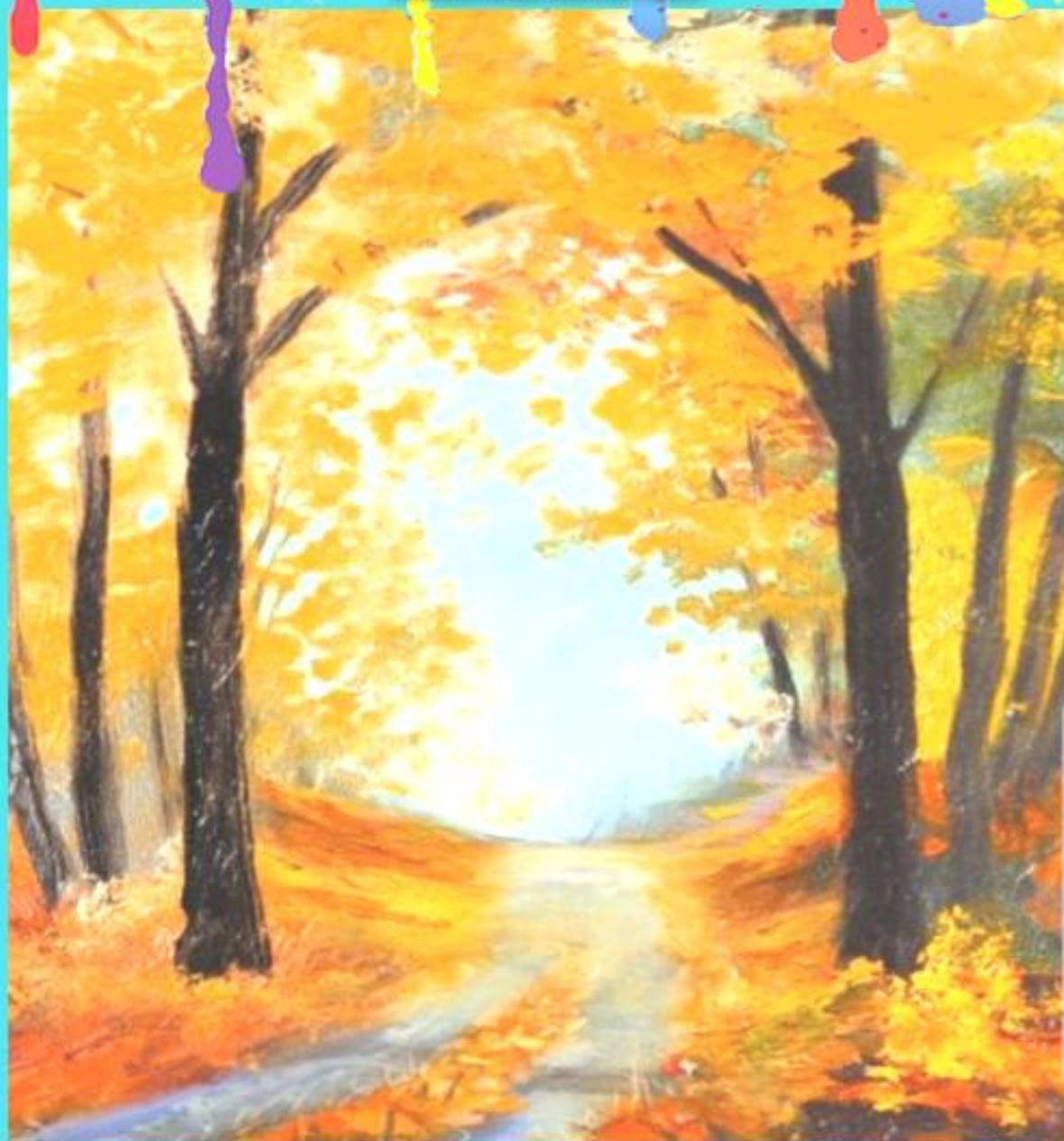
