ANTI-SEMITISM

“Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that.”
Martin Luther King, Jr.

Anti-Semitism continues to rise. To anyone paying attention, this is nothing new. Anti-Semitism has been on the rise for years. According to the Anti-Defamation League (the “ADL”), there were a total of 1,879 attacks against Jews and Jewish institutions in the United States in 2018—the third-highest year on record since the ADL began tracking such data in the 1970s. *See Audits of Anti-Semitic Incidents: Year in Review 2018* available at:

For too long, I felt this rising anti-Semitism has gone unnoticed. It appears that is changing as there has been an increase in coverage (at least in my view) of anti-Semitic events. Or perhaps it is the various social media and internet algorithms at work. Unfortunately, in our divisive world, I do not see this terrible trend reversing anytime soon. I have never understood the level of hate that drives people to commit horrible acts against another human being and I hope I never understand such hate. And it is no secret that Jews are not alone in being the target of hate crimes.

We cannot and must not sit idly by as acts of hate continue against our fellow Jews and other

targeted groups including the African-American and LGBTQ communities. We must all do our part to combat hate, and right now, we are not doing enough.

So what do we do? The answer is obvious and quite simple, but I do not see enough Jews and our allies doing anything. First, we must speak out. If you see something, say something. If something happens to you, say something. If a friend makes an off-color remark about Jews, say something. We do not have to sit silent. Advocate for legislation and other remedies to ensure there is no place for anti-Semitism.

Second, when you speak, speak with substance. We must not simply shame people. We must educate our friends and youth. The lack of basic understanding of our history is flat out scary. Social media lets people to hear and learn what they want to. People look for the story that fits their narrative without wondering whether the story is actually accurate. The ADL, American Jewish Committee and countless other organizations have a plethora of resources from which to arm yourself.

Finally, speak out on behalf of and support other vulnerable communities. We must stand united against hate. We must open our doors and keep our doors open so the world learns that we are about life, love and celebration. We must battle anti-Semitism, and, all forms of hate, by coming together as a community to celebrate our love. As Martin Luther King, Jr. said, “Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that.”

YOUR ASSISTANCE IS NEEDED

Adath Israael's morning minyan was so very important to our beloved member, Nathan Olshin. Now it is in serious trouble! We are the last synagogue in our area attempting to have daily minyan. Those of us who do attend regularly have been unable to have a consistent minyan recently. Many of our regulars have left to winter in Florida. We have also been unsuccessful in attracting any new members to meet our need of 10 to be able to pray together. We believe morning minyan is vital to the well being of Adath Israel and is especially important to those wishing to say Kaddish for their loved ones or those in need of prayer for other reasons.

Many of you do not need to be at work by 8 AM or even 9 AM. Not everyone in our congregation is still working. Please, if you are physically able, we are asking for your help to accomplish this important need for your community. We would love to see you as often as you can. Think about trying to come once a week or twice a month. Services are at 8 AM Monday through Friday, at 9:30 AM on Saturday and at 9 AM on Sunday. Services (except on Saturday) last between 20 - 45 minutes. You will be part of something important and sacred in Judaism.

The Torah service is every Monday, Thursday and Saturday. The first Wednesday of the month the service is at 7AM followed by a Kiddush. Saturday services are also followed by a Kiddush.

IF YOU OR A LOVED ONE ARE IN THE HOSPITAL OR OTHER HEALTH CARE FACILITY

Patient privacy laws prohibit the hospitals from notifying Adath Israel if you are admitted to the hospital unless you specifically request it. This is true even if you list Judaism as your religion and Adath Israel as your place of worship. Please tell the person caring for you that you wish to see the hospital chaplain. The hospital chaplain will make a referral to the Department of Spiritual Care which will contact the synagogue. If you do not wish to go through the hospital, please contact the synagogue directly if you or a loved one would like a pastoral visit.
