#### **CHANUKAH**

Dear friends,

Chanukah is really around the corner. Coming from the word

"dedication", Chanukah has a less known name: Chag HaUrim, the Festival of Lights. But one of the main questions of parents and grandparents alike is what to give the kids – and in some families, the adults – for Chanukah.

Up to the 19<sup>th</sup> century, says Jonathan Sarna, "gift giving was not really done on Hanukkah (1). It was a time when one lit candles; and ate special foods, usually fried in oil; and gave gifts of money known as Hanukkah gelt to youngsters for games. But the notion of gift giving was not known, nor were homes especially decorated, nor were Hanukkah cards exchanged.(2)"

This question is really new to our tradition. Chanukah was not known as a time of gifts – that happened, according to historian Jenna Weissman Joselit(3), when Christians began transforming Christmas in a time of gift-giving. That happened after 1820 – all because of the poem "The Night Before Christmas", according to writer Ace Collins (4). The tradition before was to give gifts during the days around the New Year, and so Jews could participate in this American gift-giving. By 1880,

that commercial shift is complete, and by 1920 Jews asking themselves what to do about the "envy of Christian children and their Christmas presents(5)."

Both Joselit and Sarna go on to state what we probably all know: Chanukah was a small holiday, on its way out, certainly in America. Its message was of non-assimilation, of remaining different. But now, just as Christians became aware of other religions and in many places (see our own Middlesex Hospital) have a Christmas tree and a Chanukiyah(6), Jews also make a certain peace with Chanukah – it became a door to participating in the gift-giving season.

But gifts, tchotchkes, stuff – all this should be secondary in any holiday. Spiritually speaking, Chanukah brings the message of light, and it begins just before the new moon, which is the darkest time of the year, when the day is shorter, the night longer, and the moon hidden. Chanukah proposes questions such as: how do we bring light to the world? How do we make this darkness disappear? What does it mean that Jews are supposed to be "a light to the nations"?

If you have children and grandchildren, you can ask them those questions as well – and you will find that Chanukah becomes a time of paying attention to who your child is, regardless of their age. At the end of the day, gifts are supposed to be a symbol of our love of our families and our tradition. Our main mistake is to forget that they are symbols, and not the end, of the holiday.

#### **CHEVRA KADISHA**

The cemetery wall replacement project has been completed. Over a period of time it had become apparent that the old wall in the front of the cemetery had deteriorated and was becoming a danger with pieces falling off and serious cracking taking place. The decision was made to take down the old wall and replace it with fencing that matches the interfaith section and the majority of the main cemetery. As a result of prior damage, the decision was also made to replace the support piers that hold the gates of the cemetery.

The new fencing along with the new support piers for the gates has greatly improved the appearance and safety of the cemetery. All of the viable plantings that were in front of the old wall were transplanted along the back edge of the main cemetery making for a neat pleasant appearance. Fox Becker is working on incorporating the letters that spelled out Adath Israel on the old wall into a new marker that will be placed in front of the new fence. Painting of the old gates will have to wait until the spring when warm weather returns. They have faded and are in need of sprucing up.

This major wall replacement project was done at considerable expense and was self-funded from the Chevra Kadisha Endowment. These funds are generated from the sale of graves to non-members and perpetual care fees. It is very important to remember that our cemetery receives no money from the synagogue's budget. Donations to the Chevra Kadisha would be greatly appreciated as a way to help offset the expense of this beautification project and the monthly maintenance expenses which are needed for the future upkeep of our cemetery.

#### **OUR CEMETERY IS NOW ONLINE**

As part of an Eagle Scout project all of the graves in our cemetery can now be viewed on an app called <u>Billiongraves.com</u>. Each grave was photographed and uploaded to the website which enables users to view the grave online. This will enable users to visit a loved one's grave virtually which is particularly helpful in this age of Covid and allows those who don't live in the area to visit a loved one's grave remotely.

On Sunday, November 29<sup>th</sup> teams of volunteers photographed and recorded each grave and uploaded it to the website. Two teams of volunteers worked in two hour shifts, following all Covid safety guidelines, to go through the cemetery and record over 700 graves. <u>Billiongraves.com</u> is trying to record every grave in America. The app can be downloaded for both Apple and Google devices. It is a free download and enables users to view headstones from any cemetery that has been recorded. Users can download photos of grave markers directly from the app.

The hospital chaplain will make a referral to the Department of Spiritual Care which will contact the synagogue. If you do not wish to go through the hospital, please contact the synagogue directly if you or a loved one would like a pastoral visit.
