Do you feel it? It's the whiplash of Omer. Let me explain – the


Omer, as I explained in the last article, is the period between Pesach and Shavuot, 49 days that we count.


The period is also sprinkled with what are called "contemporary celebrations". We begin with Yom HaShoah, the day to remember the Holocaust, on day 11 of the Omer. And follow up with Yom HaZikaron, the Day of Remembering the fallen soldiers in Israel. Talk about a sad period: and it makes sense, since the Omer also reminds us of a "plague" that struck Rabbi Akiva's students [1].

And when things get really down – then we have an incredible celebration, which is Yom HaAtzma'ut, the Israeli Independence Day. And wherever you stand on Israeli politics – you have to look and admire the miracle that the existence of Israel is. In Brazil, one of the names almost venerated by the Jewish community is Oswaldo Aranha, who rose in Brazilian politics quickly during the 1930's and eventually became president of the United Nations General Assembly in 1947. Oswaldo Aranha is seen as responsible for getting Brazil aligning with the Allies and away from the Axis, which only happened in 1942.

Even if his name is obscure to you, he was one of the decisive factors for the assembly's approval of the partition of Palestine. He was able to postpone the voting by two days, when he saw that the partition would not obtain 2/3 of the votes on time: he got Israel's allies to stretch their speeches to the max to prevent the vote from being taken that day. This gave enough time, together with the third day being a holiday in the United States to get the additional votes.

The motivations of Oswaldo Aranha are unclear to this day. Maria Lucia Tucci Carneiro[2], a historian, wrote that he was an antisemite who wanted to get Jews out of the country – her proof being that there were memos asking that Jews be denied entry visas to Brazil, that Aranha knew about those and did nothing to change. But another historian, Jeffrey Lesser[3], disputes this and shows that the attitudes in Brazil towards Jews were, unsurprisingly, contradictory. Be what it may, the fact is that when Albert Einstein's friend Helene Fabian-Katz, like him another Jew of German origin had her visa denied by the US, he asked Oswaldo Aranha for help. And Helene Fabian-Katz was granted a visa to Brazil and joined her brother, who was already living in São Paulo.

Luckily for her, Oswaldo Aranha was there. And luckily for us, when the state of Israel might not happen, it did – due to a very savvy politician.

We tend to shy away from miracles. The Talmud already warns that expecting for a miracle to happen is foolish, and against Jewish Law[4]. But once a miracle happened, you make a blessing on that miracle. Even if, 76 years later, you see problems in certain aspects of the miracle. But you still bless. Because the miracle is there, looking us in the face, in the form of a small country that dreams big, looms large in Western consciousness and is represented by our very symbol, our star, that symbolizes the presence of the Holy One – pointing equally to all sides.

So Omer gives me a whiplash every year – from destruction to miracle, all in the space of two weeks.

If you do not wish to go through the hospital, please contact the synagogue directly if you or a loved one would like a pastoral visit.



TIKKUN OLAM AT ADATH ISRAEL



Ayden Bennett is twelve years old and has been a member of our synagogue his whole life. A student in our religious school, Ayden is currently preparing for his bar mitzvah on May 8th, which will Bubby, by making my day better just by interviewing be the subject of this Tikkun Olam article.

Ayden's Torah portion will be Bamidbar which is the first section from the book of Numbers. For those unaware, it takes place after the worship of Israel family when I wish him all the success in the the golden calf, the punishment of those worshipers by the Levites, and the building of the Tabernacle. Bamidbar details the great census of the Jewish people and how the three Levite clans will act as the new guardians and caretakers of the Tabernacle; the former caretakers being the previously disgraced worshipers or firstborn.

When asked how he felt about his upcoming ceremony, Ayden honestly answered "stressed". He's feeling the brunt of having to study for his religious school classes, secular school classes, and bar mitzvah. May 8th is also Ayden's birthday, so he certainly has a lot on his plate at the moment. But despite his workload, Ayden feels confident in his progress. He talked about how the ability to read his portion from the Torah without vowels, as compared to just a few months earlier when he first started, fills him with pride. It is the knowledge he has gained that Ayden considers his gift from the bar mitzvah journey, and he has more than earned it.

What Judaism means to any one Jew is a serious and complicated topic. The same is true for Ayden who didn't sum up his feelings in a one-word answer but instead used an anecdote from school. He described a situation at school where a student made an anti-Semitic joke and justified it to their classmates by assuming that there was no one Jewish in the room. Ayden did not want to let that slide and told the class that he was Jewish and watched as the laughter died out as his classmates looked ashamed. When I asked Ayden if he felt pride in that moment, he said yes. He felt proud to be Jewish and refused to be silent when someone else decided to mock that part of him.

It may seem like an obvious answer as to where the mitzvah is in this story, as this is a Tikkun Olam article, but to me there is more than one mitzvah here. There is the upcoming mitzvah of becoming a Jewish adult and leading the congregation during services, and there is the mitzvah of studying the Torah. But perhaps the simplest and most powerful mitzvah is from Leviticus "To love other Jews". Ayden is doing that by defending Judaism at school, by studying with Rabbi Nelly every week, by honoring the traditions of his family, especially his him, and finally by giving the community a chance to reunite at his upcoming bar mitzvah. I look forward to his big day and know I speak for his entire Adath world.



Hello! Does it ever feel to you as though the need for toiletries and food never goes away? Like no matter what we do, it seems useless in some way because tomorrow there be another person or family needing support? It might be easy to fall into that way of thinking, so here's a short story for you.

A couple of months back, a regular visitor to our soup kitchen came asking for some clothing. We sat down with him to see what was going on. He was homeless, on a waiting list for housing and the weather had taken a toll on the few clothes he owned. Then he said that his flip phone was broken. He was missing calls because it didn't ring all the time. A couple of hours later he had a new but basic phone and a voucher for clothing. While walking from our building on Main Street the two miles to Goodwill, his phone rang. It was Mercy Housing, and they had an apartment for him to look at. Today he has a safe and warm apartment, a closet for clothing and is working with a counselor who helps people find employment.

Whenever I think how enormous problems seem, I think of our front door. It is a crossroads of sorts where a person can stop for a few minutes and be nourished. Then sometimes, a request for a bottle of shampoo or a sandwich turns into the event that starts another human being on the road to a more healthy, happy and successful life.

We are grateful for the in-kind gift of fresh bread, juice, snacks and toiletries that you have so generously shared with us on 04/06/2021. Please accept as fact that your donations are not wasted. They make the work we do possible, helping us to be prepared to help care for our neighbors in need.



- 3. Parent/Guardian must be a member in good standing of Congregation Adath Israel for a minimum of three consecutive years, including prior membership at Temple B'nai Abraham, prior to the date of application.
- 4. Scholarship applications <u>must</u> be accompanied by the first page of each parent's/guardian's Federal income tax form, if applicant is claimed as a dependent; or first page of applicant's Federal 1040 if not a dependent.
