As a teacher, I would like to imagine that all my students are getting along all the time. We have a joke in the 4th grade that we have kids up until winter break, and then after the New Year, they




are fully ready for middle school. The sassy comebacks spike, the verbal squabbles become saturated with heavier insults, and physical tirades rise as the temperatures, outside and inside the building, rise. It's an emotional battlefield. But unlike a Pat Benatar music video from 1983 decked in awesome eye shadow and beautiful headbands, it gets nasty.

The common insult for a boy: "You're dumb." The common insult for a girl: "You're ugly."

Both hurt. Both sting. Both create tears. And we can all relate, because we've all been those kids, on either side of the hurtful words.

But let me tell you, as a woman, we all have a secret bank. It's the Beauty Bank. We get deposits and debits, from the moment we are born to the moment we are no longer seen as a sexual object within our respective society. We grow up in a world where our relatives more often comment on our hair,

innkeeper could wake him at 4:30 a.m., because he had already been asked to wake the General at 5:10 a.m. If the Jew would hurry early in the morning and leave, the innkeeper reasoned, the General would not suspect a thing and all would be well. The simple Jew readily agreed to the deal and quietly went to bed. At 4:30 a.m., the innkeeper woke the simple Jew, who rushed to get dressed and leave the inn before the General would wake up. The simple Jew thanked the innkeeper profusely and rushed to the train station. As he stood next to the train, he saw his reflection in an window he was dressed in full uniform! "Foolish old innkeeper" he said to himself, "he woke up the General instead of me!"

All too often, we meet people and already decide how we'll judge them. A superficial look is all that it takes – and we immediately decide that we know everything there is to know about the person, and what are the limits of our relationship to them. One of the aspects of Purim is to awaken us to that tendency, and make us aware of how much we do it.

One of the mitzvot of Purim is Mishloach Manot, sending gifts of food [1]. The goal of this mitzvah is to increase friendship and foster a sense of community, reminding friends that we care. I want here to express our collective gratitude to Sandra Beckman, who has taken this mitzvah incredibly seriously this year.

But in order to increase the feelings of belonging, friendship and community, we need to see the real person in front of us, not just the image in front of our eyes. To embrace the fact that all of us are nowhere perfect, but all of us are somehow lovable and beautiful. This is the reason why we wear masks and costumes on Purim — so that we are stopped in our tracks as we make superficial judgments: when someone is wearing a mask or a costume, we know that they are dressed up. We know that it is not the real 'them', and we know that the real 'them' is behind the mask or the costume, and so we are forced to stop judging a book by its cover.

This is the message of the Purim: To remind us that the people are unique, deep, interesting and complicated and that genuine friendship cannot be based on externalities. Community and belonging depend on accepting and embracing the complex reality of human beings. All too often what we see is the real 'them'. Purim is all about making friends with the real 'them' – that which lies behind the mask!

May we seize this Purim holiday to remember that we owe to ourselves and one another to seek the presence of God in every person we meet, beyod and above the externalities.

eyes, skin, and how we are developing into fine young women. But we're not asked what our favorite subject in school is, we're asked who our latest crush is. We're not complimented on how we build sandcastles, but on how pretty the color of our bathing suit is. We're told we're funny at being flirty even before it's appropriate to flirt, through our media influences and infantilizing culture that drips into backyard barbecues and cocktail parties.

For a long time, we grow up in a world where we feel like we are the prettiest princess living there, until we are around our peers, or open a magazine, turn on MTV, or when Britney Spears announced to "hit her one more time" in 1999...I was twelve. And then we realize, through a series of our bank withdrawals, whether self-inflicted, whispered or shouted in hallways, that we are just an object that has to get molded to the desires of others, both men and women alike.

When I look at the Purim story, I cringe, I get uncomfortable, I question how to talk about this story with my niece, and my nephews in the future. Because it's such a grotesque picture of human depravity. "But wait... Carly...there are stories about death, destruction, and disease that we study, why is this so horrible?" Because women everywhere live this megillah everyday, still. Without exaggeration. Exploitation, patriarchal rulings, lewd dance parties, disguising yourself to fit the needs of a man, and feeling like you have to silence yourself in order to be liked...sounds like Purim, but that also sounds like me surviving college, or even more sadly, some of my jobs in my twenties.

How do we teach the Purim story, responsibly, to such young children? Of course, we do the developmentally responsible thing of revealing a little more each year as they get older, until we feel like the child can handle the whole truth of each part of the story. But by the time I learned the full truth about Vashti - that she wasn't just "ugly" and that's why the king got rid of her, or I learned the full truth about Esther - she really played up the king, or I learned the truth about Ahasuerushe was a disgusting drunk who was self-absorbed, no where near a Disney prince...by the time I learned about all these truths I was already experiencing a world that was depositing and withdrawing on women's bodies all the time.

Purim is a time of vast differences, good versus evil, funny versus serious, pretty versus ugly. So go into conversations in the spirit of the holiday - speak to the light heartedness of the celebration, but ease them into some of the 'hard truths' - they'll thank you later for your honesty. Maybe they'll break through the patriarchy sooner than I was able to. Maybe they will laugh, and walk around the insult in the hallway,

knowing that it's never the foolish man who makes the story. It's always a queen, with her head held high.





The book selected for our March 8th Zoom meeting is *Famous Nathan* by Lloyd Handwerker.


