As we reflect upon the year that has gone by and look forward to the new year that is now upon us, we have both lots to be proud of and new challenges to prepare for.


In 5782 our services continued both virtually and in-person while we had various groups and clubs meet regularly. Our religious school had a very active year with five students celebrating B’nai Mitzvot, a significant Chanukah celebration in collaboration with the community, and the return of our annual Purim Carnival. We launched a new Purim fundraiser and saw a historic year with the Interfaith Golf Tournament. We were also able to maintain both the lowest dues structure of any synagogue in Connecticut, as well as free religious school education, leading to 30 new members joining our congregation.

In 5783, we hope to reach our fundraising goal and subsequently break ground on the Lynn Bennett Religious School while also upgrading the security of our building through local and national grants.

Of course, we are not immune to the realities of the current economic climate. We are fortunate to have a strong endowment from the years of your generosity and that of the generations that came

Hanukkah ends up serving as a counter-balance to Christmas in American Jewish history not so much for its content, but by an accident of timing. Its celebration was a way of asserting Jewish identity. Its re-making on American soil ends up being entirely a response to Christmas and the anxieties of making the synagogue, which was a “sermon-heavy, intellectual place that offered nothing for kids” into a more kid-friendly place, for 8 days a year. Rabbis, together with the ladies’ auxiliaries, “came up with an idea of a synagogue festival for kids at Hanukkah as a way to interest kids in the synagogue: candle-lighting, singing songs, teaching the kids little skits, and then treating them to oranges and ice cream.[1]”

During the early Jewish period in American history, Hanukkah wasn’t really celebrated in the home beyond the lighting of the hanukkyah, and presents were not a thing –shocking but true. And as the mission of how to keep Judaism going in this new place for a new generation becomes more a reality and a quest for the Jewish community, Hanukkah comes to serve it well – by involving two populations that were, until then, not the center of synagogue life: children and women.

The pioneer in this, as he was in many other things, was rabbi Isaac Mayer Wise. Over the course of 39 weeks around 1860, he serialized a romance novel based on the story of the Maccabees, with the themes “religious virtues, patriotism, and strong gender distinctions,[2]” that were in tandem with the Victorian values of the time. This was not only a way of educating Jews about Hanukkah, but also a form of reassurance: Jews could be part of American culture.

And so by 1906, the *Forverts*, along with other, more Orthodox, publications, are all for advertising presents for Hanukkah, and increasing children’s enthusiasm for the holiday is their mission. But because Hanukkah is a complicated holiday – with fights and people being trampled by elephants, in a long drawn out seven-year campaign that mostly relied in guerilla tactics – it became, also, the holiday that reveals nothing regarding what Jewish life is about. And so the impetus to have it as a response to Christmas wins the day.

Take the Mensch on a Bench. This, if you haven’t heard, is the Jewish alternative to Elf on a Shelf, first made in 2013 and now sold in places like Target. Neal Hoffman, a former Hasbro employee who invented Mensch on a Bench, tells his story[3]: Hoffman is married to a Catholic and his two sons,

Jacob and Alex, are being raised Jewish. Around Christmas time, his boys kept asking for trees and presents and the dreaded Elf on a Shelf. Hoffman would retort, “Jesus is the meal, Christmas is the dessert. And you can’t have dessert if you don’t have your dinner.”

But he wanted his kids to have pride in their own cultural heritage, and not have to always play defense. And so he created the Mensch on the Bench — a stuffed mythical, long-ago Jew who sat on a bench in the Temple and made sure the oil didn’t burn down. But while his company has sold 120,000 of these dolls, the other things made for other holidays by his company have not sold well. “The truth is, we lose money on those,” he said. “We as Jews have not shown that we want to buy things for other holidays. I don’t think that’s necessarily bad, that we’re keeping the other holidays a little more pure. We’re keeping Passover about Seder and keeping Yom Kippur about the fast.”

I find quite interesting his choice of words. “Pure”, as in unadulterated. Because of the complicated origins of Hanukkah, and its placement in the calendar, Hanukkah ends up being the catch-all of our responses to something much larger and complex – the question of ‘how do we remain Jewish? How do we make sure Judaism goes on?’ Most people know about the miracle of the oil, we all know about decorations and the hanukkyah, latkes, donuts and dreidlach - and that is where Judaism stops and where the anxieties about assimilation begin.

As a response to Christmas, Hanukkah has been doing great. As a propeller to a meaningful Jewish life, not so much. My hope is that we embrace Hanukkah with all its complexities, and understand how it has become what it is: a response to Christmas –we make a minor holiday something grand because we need it to be at least as grand: cue to the Chabad public menorahs. Yet we need to be clear that a meaningful Jewish life lies in the other holidays, in the other celebrations and observances. A meaningful Jewish life is built every day, every week and every month.






REDEDICATE YOURSELF

We also grappled with the prevalence of anti-semitism today – how can we fight it and what can we do to educate others. We concluded that there were no easy answers to these questions but that we must find our voice and speak out against hatred of all types, and particularly to stand up to Jewish hate.

The book selected for the **December 13th** meeting is *Her Hidden Genius* by Marie Benedict. This novel brings to light the story of Rosalind Franklin who sacrificed her life to discover the nature of our very own DNA, a woman whose world-changing contributions were hidden by the men around her. 
