Dear Friends,

Shavuot is around the corner, falling this month on the 25th. It is a holiday very different than all others, particularly when compared to the two other "pilgrimage festivals", Pesach and Sukkot.

For starters. holidays have a given date in the Torah. Take Passover: "on the first month, on the fourteenth day" or Rosh Hashanah "the first of the seventh month". But Shavuot when you read about Shavuot in the Torah, we read "From the day after the Shabbat, the day you brought the sheaf of the wave offering, count off seven full weeks. Count off fifty days up to the day after the seventh Shabbat, and then present an offering of new grain to the Lord . . . On that same day you are to proclaim a sacred assembly and do no regular work. This is to be a lasting ordinance for the generations to come, wherever you live." So this is the first strange thing about Shavuot: "the feast of weeks", is given no calendrical date, but all the other festivals are.

And these lines gave rise to huge fights during Jewish history. Note their ambiguity: the counting of days and weeks begins "from the day after the Shabbat". But which Shabbat are we talking about? And what is the reference to a Shabbat doing here at all? The previous passage has talked about Pesach, not Shabbat. So during the times of the Second Temple, the Pharisees, who believed in both the Oral Torah and the Written Torah understood "the Shabbat" to mean, here, the first day of Pesach (the 15th of Nissan). The Sadducees, who believed in the Written Torah only, took the text literally: the day after the Shabbat is Sunday. So their count always began on that Sunday after the Shabbat

after Passover – and the two groups could be celebrating Shavuot up to six days apart.

Moreover, Shavuot in the Torah has no historical connection. Pesach has going out of Egypt (and spring) as its markers. Sukkot has the booths of the travelling in the desert (and fall) as its markers. In the case of Shavuot, all the Torah says is that it is the "Feast of the Harvest", and the "Day of First-fruits". The historical marker is given later, by the rabbis, as the day of receiving the Torah.

Finally, to compound the strangeness of Shavuot, it was the one day when we would offer bread, complete chametz, in the Temple. And this is the ONLY time when chametz was offered: all other sacrifices were never bread, they could never go through the process we call leavening. The sacrifices of grain, and the showbread, were never bread as we call it: they were matzah. But on Shavuot, the sacrifice was explicitly "two loaves of bread, baked after leavening."

Once we see how Shavuot is different, we have to ask: why? And I think that all this points to something that we, as moderns, understand: Shavuot is the holiday of HUMAN CONTRIBUTION to the process of God's presence. We are not to rely on just the gifts of time and grain – we are to transform them. We have to count the days. We have to make the offering leavened. Similarly, we received the Written Torah, the one inside the ark. But Judaism is not the religion of the Torah, it is the religion of the Torah domesticated and transformed by the rabbis.

So this year, invest yourself in the process of transforming yourself and your relationship to our tradition! Come to our Tikkun Leyl Shavuot, our night study session, to discuss and grow your own Torah.


ADATH ISRAEL ACADEMIC SCHOLARSHIPS

On display were neon signs, menus, advertisements, deli workers' uniforms, and video documentaries. Seeing the exhibit definitely made us hungry. Some of us then ventured over to Zabar's to enjoy such foods as a corned beef sandwich on rye, a knish, a piece of strudel or bring home a chocolate babka or some rugelach. Delicious!

Journey Through The Valley

Change is the only constant in life." -Heraclitus, Greek philosopher

"All change is loss and loss must be mourned" = Harry Levinson, Workplace Psychologist

Change is hard. We as human beings long for consistency. Unfortunately, life usually has other plans. We tend to think of change as all negative, but even positive change is difficult. Letting go of your first home involves grieving the memories and comfort made in your first home before you can move on. Getting married involves grieving your previous independence and single life to embrace your new partnership. Changing jobs, even for a better opportunity, involves grieving the loss of old work friends.

Negative changes are easier to recognize as loss. Most of us have experienced a negative loss in life, be it death, divorce or losing a job one or more of these is likely to happen to most of in our adult lives. One of our most important jobs as parents and role models is to show our children and young people how to navigate change and build resilience. It may not always be graceful, but we need to be able to work through it. Part of being a part of a Kehilla kedosha, is to be supportive. In my short time here at CAI, I have seen an incredibly supportive community. That being said, sometimes folks need support in situations that are not always so apparent. Like I said before, we don't always think people need support in positive situations. Also, after a negative loss, how much support do people need? For how long? In my opinion, one of the best things about Judaism is how we approach death. There is a prescribed timeline for mourning, but it is up to us as a community to provide support throughout mourning, even outside of the prescribed timeline. How often do we check on our neighbors after shiva? After shloshim? Beyond? Exactly, not as often as we should.

Please join me as we Journey through the Valley together. There are two sessions, one in the afternoon and one in the evening. The evening session is also available on Zoom. If you are going through the val-

ley, know that you don't have to journey alone. Even if you don't think you are going through a valley, come to be that supportive community for someone else. Resilience is a habit that we do not think about developing; let's do it together.
