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Dear friends,

As I write this, time seems to stand still.

We as Jews in the world are reeling from the heinous and despicable attack by

Hamas on the communities in the south of Israel, and expecting the beginning of a war, the extent of it is unknown.

Feelings are running high. Anger, hurt, bewilderment and fear are the most common I have encountered these days, among everyone I talk to. It is easy to get lost in those feelings, and I want to caution our community against painting any group of civilians as the enemy. The enemy is Hamas, and what it stands for: a Middle East without Israel (see the preamble of its charter) and maybe even a world without Jews (see article 7). The enemy is Hamas,

On Rosh Hashanah, I shared how my children tell me, like I used to tell my parents, that being Jewish can be hard.

Unfortunately, it's going to be even harder now for them and for all our children.

What I tell them though, and what I truly believe to my core, is that is exactly why it is so important.

For all the challenges our people have faced in our history, the unity that it has forged has been the vehicle of our deliverance and sheer survival.

So while we continue to explore new ways to support our brothers and sisters in Israel, I would offer that this is simultaneously a time to renew and strengthen the bonds in our own Jewish community. We are indeed a congregation of diverse needs, opinions, and backgrounds, but now more than ever, what unites us is far greater than anything that could divide us.

Our efforts to support Israel will not come at the expense of our previous plans, but in addition to them. The school will be built, our security will be upgraded, and the annual plea will continue.

More importantly though, we can support each other, pray together, and come together as often as possible in the long months, and maybe even years, ahead.

and what it sees as acceptable actions to reach its aim: boundless violence and terror. The enemy is this world view and those who subscribe to it. The enemy is not all Muslims, and not all Palestinians.

The idea that all Palestinians are responsible somehow for this led to the murder of a six-year old Palestinian American in Illinois, and to very serious injuries to his mother. Wadea Al Fayoume and his mother, Hanaan Shahin, were attacked on October 11th, despite the family living peacefully in America for more than 9 years. Such hatred and bigotry boggle the mind and break the heart.

As time progresses, we learn more details and the names of those who were killed by Hamas (1,300 is the general number) as well as those who were kidnapped (199 by the last count), to say nothing of the injured – 4,000 as another general number. And as we learn more details about the savagery of the attacks, it is easy to fall into the trap of indulging in dark and angry feelings. We are also pushed to this due to a news media that looks for clicks, and counts its success through millions of viewers, regardless of content, and that pushes us towards anger, despair and frustration.

It is important to keep informed, and it is important to also take breaks. It is important to know what is going on and how to help – there is a section in this Kolot with several actions you can do – and there is also the famous Jewish mandate of taking care of oneself, one's family and one's community.

In terms of security, we are taking care of ourselves: we did have police presence for our latest Pray-Eat-Sing. Our Middletown police are informed of our hours of higher activity (Hebrew School, service times and events) and will increase their patrols. We will strictly enforce policies about locking doors and buzzing people in. In terms of donating, please remember to do it wisely. In terms of connecting, please remember to do it kindly.

Jews are known, according to the Talmud, for three characteristics: a generous people, a kind people and a modest people. Terror also wins when it destroys in us those characteristics, when it transforms our thoughts and actions toward hatred and despair, when it makes us forget our basic humanity and goodness.

Being Jewish should never be defined only by the negative, and please seize the learning opportunities that we offer. Or if learning is not what rocks your boat, get involved in the social opportunities of community: come to minyan breakfast, volunteer for social action, attend the speaker series, join the book club, come to learn how to play Mah Jong. And if you like to sing and/or pray, come to services. And on Shabbat, also enjoy our luncheon.

The fight is not just outward, but inward as well. These are complicated times. But the murder of a sixyear-old because of his faith and his identity is not complicated. It is a heinous crime. We can't give up on trying, yearning, dreaming, even right now, of finding the way to shalom. The way to peace. May compassion, kindness, generosity and modesty prevail.

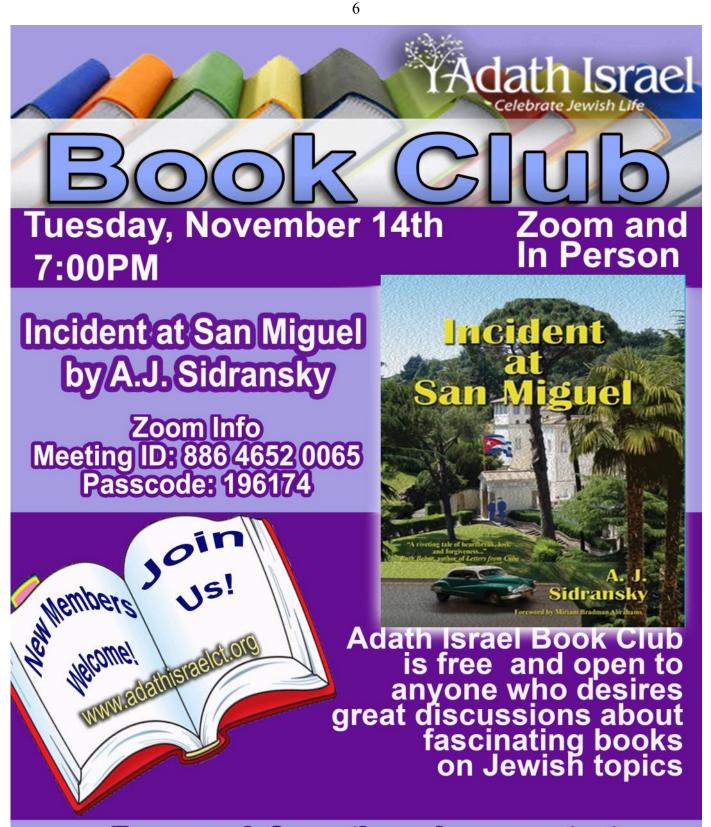

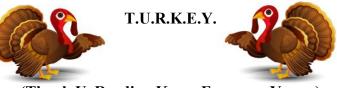
November Moments in Jewish History

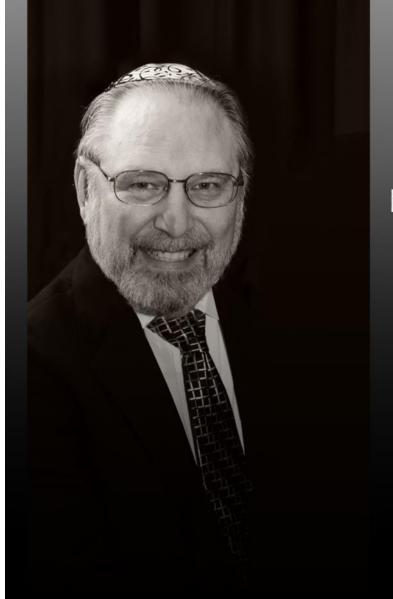

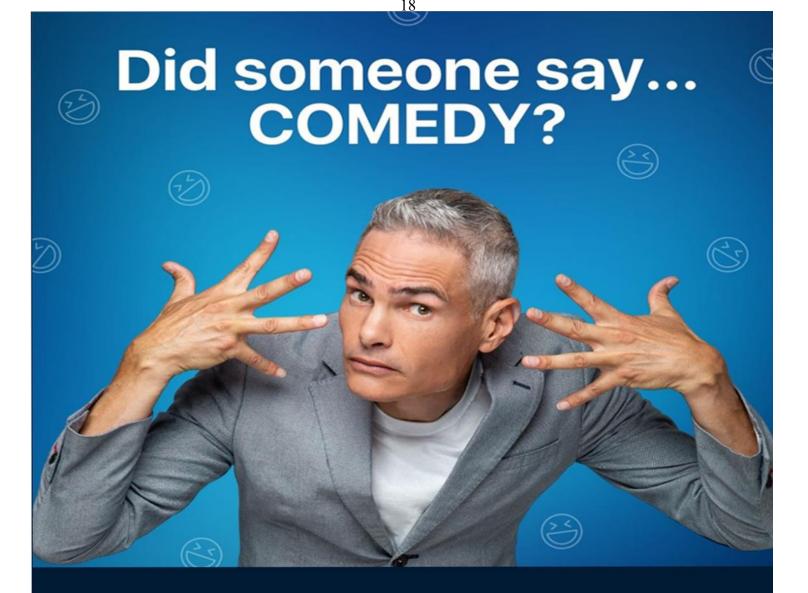
