Dear friends,

It is incredible to think it has been a month since October 7th, and the attack on Israel by Hamas.

Thirty days, *shloshim* in Hebrew, is an important marker. If shivah marks the week of most intense mourning, *shloshim* marks a moment of reinsertion in the new reality. Rabbi Chaim Shreiber explained why this time frame matters: "The Jewish calendar is based on the moon. Just as the moon waxes and wanes in a cyclical period, the 30 days of mourning are an opportunity for the closing of a full emotional circle. The process begins with the funeral and the first days of shiva, when one can't even see a glimmer of light. With the passing of time, the light returns in stages, and waxes more and more. Thirty

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

At this time last year though, a close friend made her first trip. She came home a

changed person, inspired by what she had seen, learned, and the people she had met.

If you met Rebecca Wilansky or heard any of the tributes to her in the last ten weeks, you know she was absolutely full of life, always positive, and enthusiastic. It was almost impossible to be around her and not have fun. While she left us far too soon, she left behind a legacy of living life to its fullest.

A great example is when she applied to take a trip to Israel with a group of women, none of whom she had ever met before, through the Jewish Federation of Greater Hartford. As her husband Frank told me, the trip meant so much to her that she would want to share it.

chat that lasted throughout her trip.

It began on November 12th, when she sent us a text from the airport that simply read "It's go time:)"

About 12 hours later, we received our first picture, taken from a window seat of the airplane overlooking the wing with the moon close behind. The message read, "I'm here kids:)"

For the next ten days we were treated to constant updates with pictures of where she was visiting, the friends she was making, and videos of the



celebrations she was participating in ranging from Tsfat to Old Jerusalem.

Her trip meant so much to her that she not only agreed to be our vice-president

shortly after she returned, she also joined with other women from her group to form a new organization, Yaysh, that is spearheading future trips to Israel similar to the one she attended. She



was even planning a return trip to Israel in 2025.

She also encouraged me to do the same. We even talked about planning a trip for our families and opening it up to members of the congregation.



I regret there won't be a chance to take that trip together, but I am grateful that I was able to share in her trip in some small way and have the memories of her transformational experience illuminate my thoughts at a time when so many of us are keeping Israel and Jews around the world in our prayers. I am grateful she experienced such an incredible and powerful trip to Israel before the events of October 7, 2023. I am hopeful trips to Israel like Rebecca experienced will be returning soon at a time when Israel finds and can have a lasting peace and be the Promised Land Jews have always envisioned and dreamed.

Once the money is raised and the bookcase is purchased, the library will be open for business.


Then we will work on hours of operation and publish it in Kolot. The library will be on the honor system – take a book and bring it back when done enjoying it,

days is an important period of time, a time for renewal and grasping a new reality."

I feel that I aged much in these thirty days. Maybe even thirty years. I feel both thirty years wiser and thirty years sadder. And what have we learned in these thirty days?

First, during those moments of darkness, there was bravery. And that bravery was not only "give me a truck and a gun and let me go rescue people", as the stories of Israel Ziv, Noam and Gali Tibon, and Yigel Singer tell us. There was the bravery of sending grenades back to the terrorists, as Aner Shapira did, as he defended his friend Hersh Goldberg Polin and more than 20 other people trapped in a bomb shelter. All those you can Google.

But then there was the bravery of Shlomo Ron, a story that did not make the headlines here in America because it is of a different type of bravery, a quiet type, keeping in part with the character of Shlomo, whose story I only learned because of a post on Facebook by Hadas Goz. Shlomo was not armed with a weapon, but with an intense love for his daughters, his wife, and his grandson. He also loved theater, music, art and poetry, and books. He was old, quite ill, with glasses, a moustache, and a gentle soul. When the terrorists came to Nahal Oz, his kibbutz, Shlomo went at first with the family-wife, daughters and grandson-to the ma'amad, the safe room. But as they began understanding what the situation was, thanks to the internal messaging system in the kibbutz, Shlomo went out of the ma'amad, and waited, sitting in the living room, for the terrorists. His hope, his plan, was that the terrorists would think that in this house lived an old man, alone, and they would kill him and move on. And this is what happened—he was able to save his beloved family.

Another thing I have learned is that the best thing to say is the obvious: there are no words. Because, many times there is nothing to be said—no words of comfort and certainly no platitudes. *Ayn milim*, say the Israelis: There are no words. There is just showing up however you are able: letters, emails, calls, drawings, donations. Yehuda Kurtzer, the president of Shalom Hartman Institute, had a trip scheduled for October 14 that had been planned months in advance. He did not cancel it, as he never cancels trips to Israel, nor did ElAl, which was, just by chance, the airline he was flying that week. All the others had cancelled. And

Yehuda spoke on the podcast *Identity/Crisis* about his experience that week-how every person, including the server at the restaurant, was glad that he was there. And how he felt this was "nothing...I don't want accolades for just showing up" but then he understood it is like when you show up for shiva. It's not like you changed anything, but you showed up, and the family knows. The same thing happened to Yehuda Kurtzer, and the same thing happens every time you show up.

The son of one of my best friends is in the IDF. And I know that the only thing I can do is to be there with him, as he (and I, to a much lesser degree) breathe relief every time the "boy" is able to send a message that he is fine. And the "boy" – well, I have watched him grow up since age 6. He is a young father right now, and like most able-bodied young men and women, is serving. I call his father twice a week, and we commiserate. And let me tell you, Psalm 140 has never been so needed in my daily davening, never so full of meaning as it is now.

There is also the incredible resilience and initiative of our sisters and brothers in Israel; something we can all learn. How out of the same groups that were protesting the government, sprung a tight net of help. In the podcast *Can We Talk* a recent episode called "The Women's War Room," featured the feminist organization *Bonot Alternativa* (Building an Alternative) and how they shifted their work to be providers of services and goods for people of all political stripes. It has been said that in Israel the institutions are fragile, while the sense of community is strong, and this month has definitely shown that.

The last thing I will say about lessons of this month is quite simple, but we as a people seem to have forgotten: we are all together in this. This past year has been a difficult one for Israel and for Israeli-American relations. *Eretz Nehederet*, a satirical show similar to *Saturday Night Live*, put it succinctly in a one-minute skit. In it, the scene is the soldiers boarding the bus, all in uniform, as the roll-caller calls them. But not by individual names, which is actually how it is done. The sketch used all the political camps, using all the name-calling of the past year: "anarchists, Bibists, traitors, messianists, backstabbers of the country, destroyers of democracy, Arab-lovers, bigots, criminals, entitled people wearing Rolexes, dykes destroying the army, first

Israel, second Israel, fifth-columnists"...and all are boarding the bus. Because when push comes to shove, we are all in this together.

The grief of the attack has morphed into a position of clear-eyed unity of many camps, even in those critical of Israel's politicians, politics, and policies. Ephi Shoham is such a person: he, too, was a leader in the protests, and then his organization Brothers and Sisters in Arms also morphed into social services. And then, his three sons were called for army duty. He could-and it would be quite expected, were he an American-he could have said: I don't trust the Israeli Government, I will not allow my sons to fight for its wars. He could, but he didn't. He is able to compartmentalize between what it means to be an angry citizen, frustrated with his government, and a responsible citizen helping to fill in the gaps that the government cannot; and a loyal citizen who sends his sons to defend his country.

In that sense we too, in the diaspora, feel it. In the diaspora, we have a sense, too, of how Jews are seen by certain groups, regardless of their like or dislike of Israel. We are all together in this. Here, the kind of battle we are in for is a battle of information, critical thinking, and moral compass. It is important to realize what Hamas stands for; how there are thousands of innocent lives on the line, both among Israelis and among Palestinians, and what the geopolitics of the region are. It is important to be able to articulate our values and our stand. And above all, we should always remember that ours is a people who affirm life, the value of life, and the value of living. Ours is a people for whom that small piece of land-remember, all we are talking about fits inside the state of New Jersey-is beloved, despite all its problems.

As Bono sang, "There is no end to grief . . . and there is no end to love."

May we continue to grow in our understanding and learning of all aspects of this war, and may we find ways to show up for Israel and to help all those affected by the war. Please refer to the next column for suggestions.



Bagels, tuna salad, egg salad, lox & sliced veggie platter, whitefish salad, plain & chive cream cheese, sesame noodles, kugel, fruit salad, pastry, cold & hot drinks

Friday Night Oneg Shabbat (15 people): \$54

Pretzels, fruit, M&M's, pastry, cold & hot drinks

Prices for both a Kiddush and/or an Oneg Shabbat will be adjusted if there is a larger group in attendance for special life cycle events (Bar/Bat Mitzvah, baby naming, or wedding, etc.).

Of course, you can always purchase the food, bring it to the synagogue and do the set up yourself while also following the synagogue's Kashrut guidelines. Some assistance may be available on the day of your Kiddush.
