He had come during the summer to talk about the value he, as an Israeli, sees in Masorti Judaism, which is how Conservative Judaism is known in Israel. His story is an incredible one.

Born and raised in Israel, he had a bar mitzvah just to please his grandmother, his savta. His family was not religious in any way, but savta was insisting and he loved her. So he worked for six months, learned the tropes and the Torah portion, gave savta an enormous moment of

I first became exposed to daily morning prayers when my grandfather (who was an orthodox rabbi) would visit us in San Francisco from Chicago. I was around six/seven when I became aware of them. Around the time of my bar mitzvah, I started wearing Tefillin and saying daily prayers alone. I think that lasted for around six or so months and I continued off and on. In college, there was a group of us that decided to do morning prayers together at our fraternity house (AEPi).

After graduation I moved to Connecticut and was happy to be in a large Jewish community. Work precluded any sort of a morning minyan practice. I did develop a practice of regular Shabbat attendance. When my father died, some 30 years ago, I was self-employed and was able to start a daily morning minyan practice which I have continued to this day (except for five of the years I lived in Delaware). When Covid hit, I resumed a daily practice on Zoom via CAI.

Now that I have returned to Connecticut my goal is to attend morning minyan in person every day.

Being fully retired, I find the morning minyan a "great" reason to get up. I am drawn to the minyan primarily not for religious reasons. There are multiple reasons why I am drawn to the minyan. (1) During the earlier years the fellowship developed was very powerful—most days we went to breakfast after services. (2) It makes me feel good to be part of a historically long tradition. (3) I especially feel good at minyan when a person arrives to fulfill a particular religious need and I am there to enable that to happen. Under Rabbi Altenburger we have added a monthly breakfast in addition to the on-going "early riser's minyan to continue the minyan's comradery.

happiness – in a regular, Orthodox shul he never set his foot afterwards. Fast forward twenty years, he is involved with a Jewish Federation in America as a sheliach in Arizona. And the first invitation he receives is for a bat mitzvah in a Conservative shul. He was astounded: the grandmother of the bat mitzvah girl was called for an alyiah, and the granddaughter read Torah for the grandmother. The families are embracing on the bimah. Men and women are sitting together. And he thought about his own savta, absconded in the women's section, hidden behind a trellis - and with his small voice of a thirteen year old, he was not even sure she heard him. And that Shabbat morning transforms him, enabling him to see the case for religious pluralism in the State of Israel.

This moment led him to grow as a Jew and to become the CEO of the Masorti movement in Israel, and in 2020 he became the Vice Chairman of the WZO.

So it was with some trepidation that I received an email from him, asking to sit and chat through zoom. The main point in that meeting was the need to keep pluralism alive and well as an essential value in the Jewish people in general and in the State of Israel in particular. Jewish Peoplehood – the idea that we are all connected, and accept each other as Jews despite living Judaism in profoundly different ways – is the seed of the value of pluralism.

We can only shape the future of our people by participating. It is both with excitement and a sense of responsibility that I strongly invite you to know more about the World Zionist Congress, and your power to make your voice heard. The World Zionist Congress is a platform for us to unite, collaborate and contribute to the shaping of our collective destiny. The policies and initiatives of the WZO influence the path of Jewish life, culture, and advocacy worldwide.

The WZC plays a vital role in preserving and promoting Jewish identity, culture, and heritage. By actively engaging in the Congress, we strengthen our representation as progressive and liberal Jews, and contribute to the diversity of perspectives within the Zionist movement.

Our commitment to the well-being and prosperity of the State of Israel is paramount – and so are the values that the State has. By participating in the Congress, we actively contribute to the development of policies that align with our values and promote not only a strong and secure Israel, but also a vision for the State that is pluralistic and democratic, and not a theocratic, fundamentalist state.

So I hope you will search for and get informed about the World Zionist Congress, and when the elections come in 2025 you will engage in shaping our collective future.



Come be "together", bring your friends, and join us for an evening of comedy and connection!






A Blizzard of Good Books

The Book Club meetings are held at The Nester Center at 7 p.m. as well as via Zoom. We are using a hybrid model so that more people can participate. Come join us!



Updated Chevra Kadisha Rules & Regulations

An updated Chevra Kadisha Rules & Regulations was recently approved. The update contains some clarifying language regarding headstones in the cemetery along with changes in cemetery fees. The perpetual care fee which is a one-time fee is used to maintain the cemetery and is charged when a loved one dies and is buried in the cemetery. Currently, the fee is \$900 per grave. With the approval of the update this fee will increase to \$1,000 effective March 1, 2024. The increase was necessary due to the ongoing cost of cemetery maintenance. The fee for nonmember graves is also increasing to \$6,000.

Anyone wishing to reserve a grave, hopefully not needed for a long time, should take advantage of the lower cost and contact the office and pay the perpetual care fee before it increases on March 1.
