In Defense of a "Tough Sell"

Dear Friends,

As summer is upon us, with longer days, I'd like to invite you to try to add Jewish meditation in to your Jewish living. "Wait, rabbi" – I can hear you! – "I have never heard of Jewish meditation"!

Well, the fact is that even though this has not been stressed in the Conservative movement, that does not mean it's not there. Reports of meditation experiences are widely found in Jewish texts, and Rabbi Aryeh Kaplan wrote extensively about them. First published in 1978, his book Meditation and the Bible is still in print, showing how extensively the

It was a couple of years ago in a board meeting, when the subject of morning minyan came up. One of the questions that was posed was how to get younger generations to participate.

I remember thinking, and later conveying, that it was a 'tough sell' for people who had young families and/or trying to get a jump-start on their work day.

The response appropriately articulated all of the benefits of attending: the daily structure; the sense of community; connecting with our faith to start the day; etc...

It was all true. I don't think anyone denied it, but there was an uneasy quiet in the room that reflected people's inability to commit. I tried to summarize that sentiment with a final comment that was something to the effect of 'unfortunately I just don't think many of us (speaking for those middle-aged people in the room who still appreciate being described as young) are going to be able to do that,

until we have to.'

Well, 'until we have to' began in November for me. Since then, I've seen first-hand that EVERYTHING said in that meeting was true, both the virtues and, candidly, the inconvenience for many of us.

In the last six months, I've called or zoomed into daily minyan from the bus stop, the car, in an airplane, in the baggage claim at an airport, other countries, and plenty of other places in between. It is, quite literally (yes Rebecca I'm using that word again), the best I can do. When my Zeyde passed, my Dad came to the Shul every day to say Kaddish. I'm just not able to physically be there in person with the nature of my job, but I'm grateful to have the technology to be able to join virtually.

There have been a couple of days recently when we did not have a minyan and thus those of us who came to say Kaddish were unable to do so, at least amongst our community. With the summer approaching, I know attendance is likely to be more and more unpredictable.

So, with that in mind, I wanted to add another reason to consider attending morning minyan...

It's a Mitzvah!

You're allowing people like me, and others, to say Kaddish. You're allowing others who value the minyan as a foundation of their daily architecture to maintain it. And that doesn't require you to attend in person, or even attend for the whole service. So, if you're driving to work, or at the bus stop, or sitting down at your desk to get your day started, you can zoom or call in. That's all it takes. You can mute the phone and turn the camera off. I know because I often have to do it.

It also doesn't require you to agree with the time the minyan starts, the length of the service, or the melodies. Because there are a wide variety of opinions on all of those subjects (trust me!).

All it requires is you to have as few as 5 minutes (because that will get us to the first Kaddish) or maybe even the full 35 or so to dial in (929-205-6099; meeting ID 863 5646 9422) Monday through Friday at 8am or Sunday at 9am. Of course, the full Shabbat service begins Saturday morning at 9:30am.

We'll be here all summer long. It is very likely I'll be

calling in from more random and unexpected places. If you can too...we would be very grateful!

practice of meditation is in Jewish sources. He also wrote <u>Jewish Meditation</u>, a practical guide, in which you can find many ideas and techniques. Jewish meditation has several strategies, and here are a few:

Simply sitting there in silence. The Mishnah (compiled on 200 CE) describes the early pious as meditating for one hour before engaging in prayer. Maimonides interprets this to mean to sit silent and motionless so as "to settle minds and quiet thoughts". The Awakened Heart Project, by Rabbi Jeff Roth, has many resources in this area: https://awakenedheartproject.com/

Jewish meditation is also movement, as Rabbi Akiva (d. 132 CE) is described as "bowing and prostrating himself to the point he moved from one corner of the room to the other while praying at home." T'ai Chi master and spiritual philosopher Yehudit Goldfarb has developed a series of movements called Otiot Chayot, and you can lean about that technique here: http://otiyot.com/

Sitting and focusing your attention to a Shiviti artwork, an image that contains usually a psalm and the four-lettered name of God. You can find many examples in the internet, but the most common is the menorah. You can find it here: https://tinyurl.com/shiviti18

Hitbodedut: a practice of speaking directly to God, emptying yourself to the point of making yourself totally transparent, until you feel encompassed in the oneness of God. The greatest master of this technique was R. Nachman of Bratzlav, who believes the best time to do this is at night, when you are away from chasing wordly things. You can find his <u>Likutei Mohoran</u> at Sefaria.org, and he explains the technique at length on chapter 52. It is all translated into English.

Chanting, mantra-like, a verse, be it from Torah, Psalms or a piece of the liturgy. Rabbi Shefa Gold has mastered this technique, you can find her work on YouTube, and no Hebrew knowledge is necessary.

Visualization of the Tree of Life and Sefirot. Rabbi David Cooper, whose work God Is a Verb is fantastic, has all his meditations available at https://www.rabbidavidcooper.com/

Doing the exercise "100 blessings every day". As it sounds, you have to find 100 moments in which to offer a blessing. The power of transformation of this

practice is depicted in the short story "The Curse of Blessings", present in the book of the same name, written by Mitchell Chefitz.

But wait, there is more! The entirety of our morning service is a series of meditations. Unfortunately, most of us are unaware of this. In his Davening: A Guide to Meaningful Jewish Prayer, Rabbi Zalman Schachter-Shalomi teaches several of them, and then he writes: "Many who live their lives as Jews, even many who pray every day, live on a wrapped and refrigerated version of prayer. We go to synagogue dutifully enough. We rise when we should rise, sit when we should sit. We read and sing along with the cantor and answer 'Amen' in all the right places. We may even rattle through the prayers with ease. We sacrifice vitality for shelf-life, and the neshomoh, the Jewish soul, can taste the difference." So take the challenge of going through a small, short service, such as a Wednesday morning minyan or an afternoon service, Mincha - but with feeling and with the techniques he teaches. A little with intention, says Menachem Mendel of Kotzk, is better than a lot without. God does not count how many words you say, but how much time you spend in God's presence, searching for connection.

With the long days of summer, take a moment to embrace a new practice, or renew one you already have. Your soul will thank you, and you will be more attuned to the great fall holidays, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.







It is said that Abraham would keep all four sides of his tent open regardless of the weather, so that he might see travelers coming from any direction, run to greet them, and welcome them into his home. 





