A Recipe for Difficult Times

Dear Friends,

What does it mean to be

Jewish? That was a question a friend of mine asked his soon-to-be father-in-law.

"A Jew is someone who does mitzvot," came the answer. "Okay. And what is a mitzvah?" my friend asked.

"I'll show you," said the father-in-law, and he took my friend to his first shiva minyan—which was also his firstever Jewish service. And then he got it: mitzvot are a way of connecting to something more refined than our individualistic tendencies. And my friend was hooked.

As some of you know, our good friend Joe Fine has been without a car for a while and will be for a while longer. This has been a great opportunity for many of you to perform a mitzvah, but no greater mitzvah happened a couple of weeks ago.

Ryszard, Joe's driver that Friday night, went to Joe's house, but although the house was lit, no one came to the

Mensches Among US

One of the very first lessons I learned about Judaism was the

principle of Tzedakah. This was taught both in our own Adath Israel religious school (or "Hebrew School" as we used to call it) and at home. For my grandfather, it was at the core of what it meant to be Jewish.

He grew up in New York, but when he first arrived in the Middletown area, he was a man of modest means. He benefitted from the Tzedekah of others, including those in our community. My Dad used to tell stories about how when he was a child, and my grandparents were struggling to make ends meet, they couldn't always afford the medicine he needed. It was the Sadinsky family—and Hy Sadinksy in particular, who was a pharmacist—who would always make sure my family got what they needed, telling my Zeyde to "pay what he could, when he could."

I grew up hearing stories of this collective spirit of community and Tzedekah, especially within our community. While my Zeyde was never a wealthy man, the importance of charity rooted in his Jewish upbringing was one of his defining characteristics. He believed not just in helping whenever he could, but in helping without credit. He never wanted recognition, preferring to remain totally anonymous.

It is this specific concept of Tzedakah—doing good not for the credit, but for the sake of helping others and just because it was the right thing to do—I was taught from

an early age as being so fundamental to what it means to be Jewish.

In my current role within our community, I get to see countless examples of the generosity and charity of those in our congregation, both monetarily and in other ways. So many people have stepped up to help our community, in very significant ways, just in the last two years; and in many cases, it is impossible to thank them appropriately, simply because they don't want the credit.

One recent example really resonated with me, but in order to relay it, I will have to be intentionally vague to respect this person's wishes to remain anonymous. Suffice it to say though, our community needed something done and this person took it upon themselves to do it. It was a significant investment of time and effort. They did it repeatedly until the job was done, and helped numerous families in the process—most of whom will never even know who they owe their thanks to.

While neither they, nor I, are able to thank this person the way we would like, I share the few details I can only to say: there are still mensches among us. People who do good, only for the sake of doing good. People who help others, only for the sake of helping others. They are in our community. They are more prevalent than we may realize. And while they may not get the credit they deserve, they are a credit to values that our faith teaches and an inspiration for others.

Every month or so it seems, scammers send out emails pretending to be from Rabbi Nelly or a member of the Board. Below are some tips on how to avoid getting snagged by one of these phishing expeditions.


*Common warning signs of phishing include:

- Unfamiliar greeting or tone
- Unsolicited messages
- Grammar and spelling errors
- Sense of urgency
- Suspicious links or attachments
- Requests for personal information
- Inconsistencies in email addresses, links, etc.
- Unusual requests
- Alerts that you've won something

Please remember: No one from Adath Israel will ever ask you for personal information or financial assistance via an email. If you have *any* question, do not respond to the email. Contact the person it claims to be from via a trusted method. DO NOT use any email, website, or phone number included in the suspicious message. If it is spam, please report it to your email provider.

door when Ryszard pressed the doorbell. Ryszard then drove to Adath and informed the rest of the community about what had transpired. Amazingly, the community sprang into action, deciding what to do and who to call after Joe did not answer his cellphone. It ended with services beginning a bit later than usual, but the police were contacted, and a welfare check was quickly made. Given that Joe lives alone, no one wanted to take any chances.

And all is well when it ends well—it turned out to be just a bad doorbell.

But that moment showed the power of community for all of us. We felt anxious together, we found a course of action together, a mitzvah, really: "Do not stand idly by." And we were happy with the outcome together.

Our rabbis say, "Get yourself a rabbi, acquire for yourself a friend" (Pirkei Avot 1:6). A community—people who will support and hold you as we journey through life together—people who have your back, even if you don't agree with everything they think or do—that is what helps us through the difficult times.

This was the rabbis' recipe for surviving their difficult times, and their times were indeed hard: the Temple had been destroyed, the Romans were killing anyone opposed to them, and religious persecution was severe. And this same recipe works for our difficult times—times that are indeed challenging. Just ask any number of people who feel filled with depression and anxiety. Open any media, and things are challenging to say the least. Open any screen, and we are met with a harsh reality that was true even before October 7th. Times are hard.

And this is the recipe our rabbis gave us to survive difficult times: have someone you trust to bounce ideas off of, learn with them, and be in a community. Be invested in making someone's life important to you. Love of the other—the other human being—is an expression of the love for the Other, God, the ultimate Other. It is in the caring for one another that we uncover the *Shechinah*, God's presence, because we become invested in multiplying the good around us.

Updated Chevra Kadisha Rules & Regs

The Chevra Kadisha Rules & Regulations were recently updated to incorporate a clear statement that cremains may not be buried in either section of the Adath Israel Cemetery.

Anyone wishing to be buried in our cemetery must undergo some form of Taharah, the ritual cleansing of the body before burial. Taharah cannot be performed on a deceased who will be cremated (even prior to cremation). Therefore, cremains cannot be buried in the cemetery.






