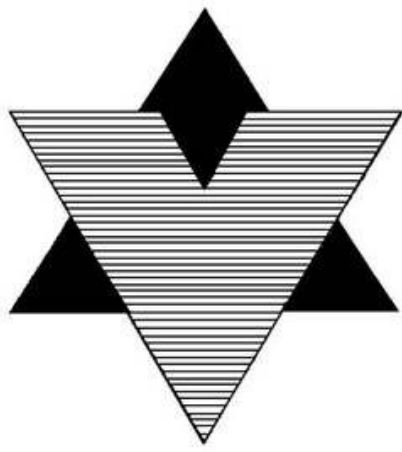

Welcoming the Guest

Dear Friends,

We know what the end of the summer brings: the high holidays. And we pride ourselves in making our community one in which all feel welcome. If there is one teaching of the tradition that we strive to uphold it is *hachnasat orchim*, welcoming the guest.

Our tradition does not begin its teaching on hospitality with a rule. It begins with a picture: Avraham sits at the entrance of his tent in the heat of the day, sees three strangers approaching, and runs to meet them. He bows and then hurries to bring water and bread and the best cut of meat (sorry vegetarians!) to give to his guests. The Torah spends a great number of verses describing this, Avraham's haste in doing this, because the haste is the point: welcoming that waits to be asked for, welcoming that delays, welcoming that comes with preconditions, is not really welcoming.

The Sages press the idea further still: "greater is the welcoming of guests than receiving the Divine Presence itself", they say on Shabbat 127a. Greater than greeting God! It is an astonishing claim, and it is meant to startle us. The stranger at our door is not an interruption of the sacred. The stranger is the possibility of touching the sacred.

I write about this now because of something that happened recently in our own midst, on an evening that should have held nothing but joy.

A young family came to us for the first time — guests, brought by members of our own community for a Kabbalat shabbat service. Their little preschooler did what small children do when a room fills with melodies: tried to sing along, wanted to dance. For a few moments there was the unmistakable sound of a child swept up in the gladness of Shabbat. And then, instead of a warm smile, that family met sharp words. They were told, in effect, that if they could not keep their child quiet, they should leave. So they did. They have not come back — and they won't.

I have since reached out to both families to offer my apology. But I will be honest with you, because you deserve honesty, and because I hold myself to it first: an apology after the fact cannot fully undo what a single hard moment teaches a newcomer about who we are.

This was not the first time someone among us has lost patience with the noise of a child, and in the past I have stopped a service in its tracks to make plain that a

Before you immediately think, "**I don't have time for that!**" - please keep reading!

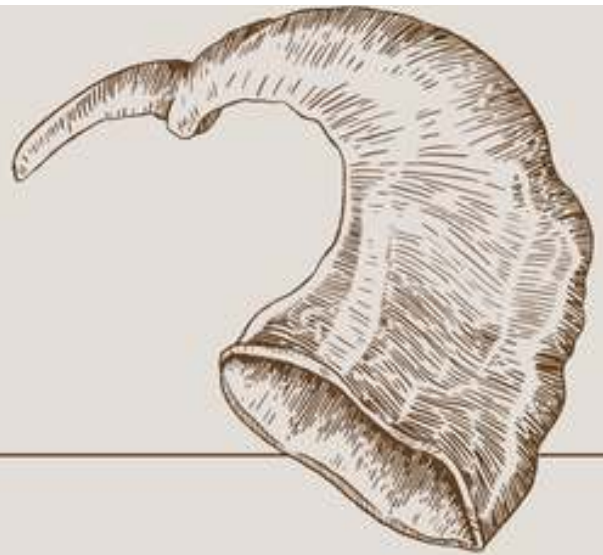

Whether you enjoy caring for others, planning events, developing creative programs, bringing people together, or simply helping behind the scenes, there is likely a place where your interests and talents can make a difference.

Committee service can also be a wonderful way to become more involved in synagogue leadership. It gives you an opportunity to learn more about how Adath Israel operates, work alongside other members, and help shape our future. 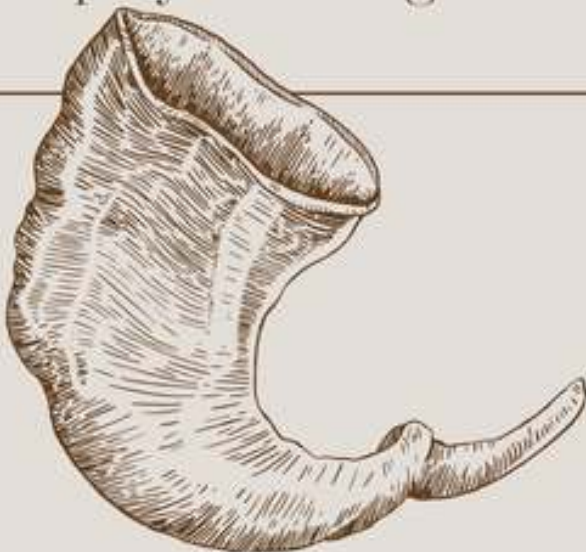

child's voice belongs in this room. This time I did not. My attention was taken by another matter that now seems very small – a glitch in the sound system. By the time I understood what had happened, the family was already gone. I will not hide behind the explanation. A community's values are not proven in its newsletter; they are proven in the instant of connection. Unfortunately for us, in that instant, a family who needed someone to stand and say stay, you are welcome here, found silence.

It does not matter how warmly our website describes us, how many times we call ourselves a welcoming congregation: if a guest among us can be made to feel that a child's voice is unwelcome here, those are empty words. We are not measured by the words we publish: we are measured by the face we turn towards the stranger who makes us feel uncomfortable.

There is a teaching that has been gnawing at me since: Resh Lakish taught in the name of Rabbi Yehudah Nesiah that the world endures only for the sake of *hevel tinokot shel beit rabban* — the breath of schoolchildren (Shabbat 119b). What does this mean? I see that our broken world, in this teaching, could be completely destroyed – but God holds Godself back because of the breath of the children. Not because of the prayers of the pious. Not because of the learning of scholars. Not because of services that are long. Or short. No, it is the breath of the children — their noise, their restlessness, their unselfconscious song and dance. I will say it again, as I said it in the past: A community that has no patience for the natural noises and movement of young children is a community with no future.

Our congregation is growing, and it is changing. The families finding their way to our doors arrive in more shapes, more colors, and more configurations than the synagogue of a generation ago. This is not a problem to be managed. It is a blessing to be run toward, the way Avraham ran.

And if Avraham is not enough, let me remind us that the Torah commands us: *Ve'ahavtem et ha-ger* — you shall love the stranger, *ki gerim heyitem* — for you yourselves were strangers (Deuteronomy 10:19). We of all peoples know what it is to walk into an unfamiliar room and search the faces for a single welcoming one. And we should understand something about that search: a new person, a new family that does not yet see itself reflected in the room often arrives already braced for

the possibility that it does not belong — reading every face, weighing every word. For them, our welcome must be warmer than we think strictly necessary, because a careless harshness does not register as one bad moment. It confirms a fear they carried in with them: that they are not worthy of our blessings, of our love, of our Judaism.

"But Rabbi! I came to hear your words, and the kid started up just as you began to speak." I can already hear that reply, because I have heard it before. I understand that, and I appreciate your willingness to hear my take on Torah. But let us be honest about what is actually at stake. My words are not going anywhere. I post every drasha on our website, I can happily provide written copies. A drasha can be repeated, it can be read at night in your pajamas. And on the other hand – people made to feel unwelcome do not come back to be welcomed properly the second time.

When we weigh the two, we know: it is not a close call. Let me say it as plainly as I can: nothing I can say from the bimah is as important as a family finding their spiritual home with us. Not my finest drasha, not the most beautiful melody, not the most perfectly run service. Those are the vessels – they are not the essence of our future.

And there was, in that moment, a third path that no one took, a path that would have been gentler than shushing and definitely kinder than "please leave." Any one of us could have risen quietly, crossed the room with a smile, and shown that family the toys and the corner we keep in the social hall for exactly this. "Please leave" and "let me show you where the little ones play" buy the very same quiet in the sanctuary. They teach opposite lessons about who we are. To make this solution even more viable, some toys will be placed in the foyer near the coat room.

I know that these words sound like a harsh rebuke, and that is not my intent: my intent is our collective teshuvah, our recommitment to our core values, to our dream of being a community that makes space for all kinds of Jews. We cannot undo their evening. That family is not coming back; I have not pressed them to, because some choices deserve to be respected rather than argued with.

But what we can do is make certain that the next family who walks through our doors with a singing, dancing, gloriously restless child meets something entirely different: love.

The high holidays are coming. May we live to see the words of Yose ben Yochanan reflecting us: *Yehi beitcha patuach lirvacha* — let your house be open wide. (Pirkei Avot 1:5). Wide. Not open a careful crack for the people who already look and sound like us. When new faces appear in our community let us all run to meet that person, that seeker, that family, the way Avraham ran. And when a child sings, even off-key, even at the wrong moment, even a little too loudly, let the sound be sweet in your ears. Because, friends, that is the sound of a community that intends to still be here in fifty years.

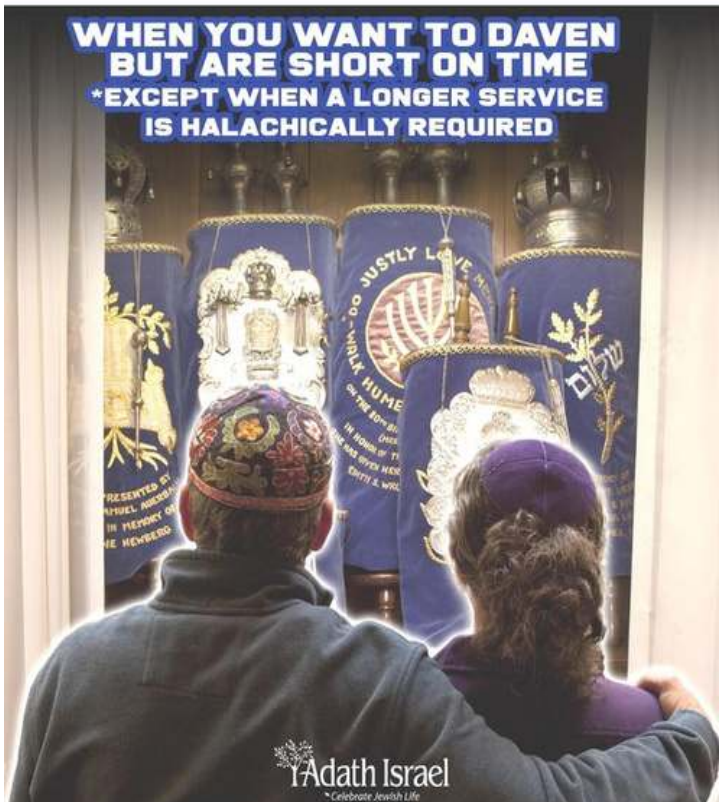
Sunday Meals Program

Phishing Awareness: Avoid Taking the Bait

Every month or so it seems, scammers send out emails pretending to be from Rabbi Nelly or a member of the Board. Below are some tips on how to avoid getting snagged by one of these phishing expeditions.

Common warning signs of phishing include:

- Unfamiliar greeting or tone
- Unsolicited messages
- Grammar and spelling errors
- Sense of urgency
- Suspicious links or attachments
- Requests for personal information
- Inconsistencies in email addresses, links, etc.
- Unusual requests
- Alerts that you've won something

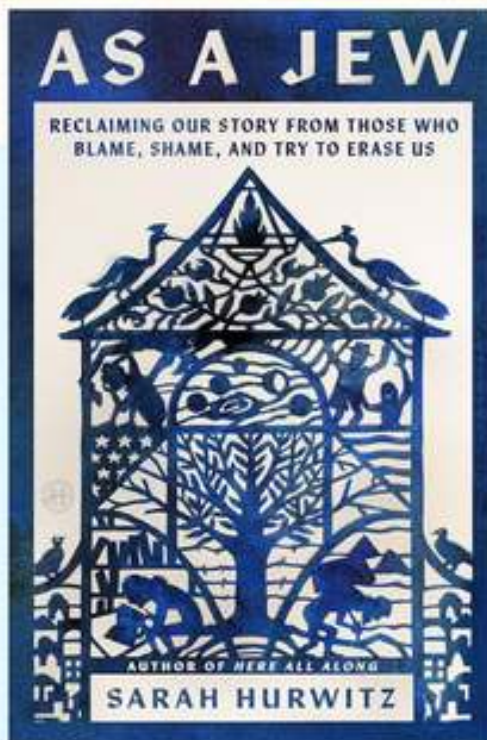

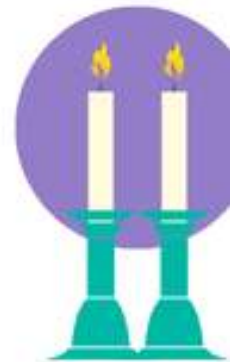

Bagels, tuna salad, egg salad, lox & sliced veggie platter, whitefish salad, plain & chive cream cheese, sesame noodles, kugel, fruit salad, pastry, cold & hot drinks

Friday Night Oneg Shabbat (15 people): \$54

Pretzels, fruit, M&M's, pastry, cold & hot drinks

Prices for both a Kiddush and/or an Oneg Shabbat will be adjusted if there is a larger group in attendance for special life cycle events (Bar/Bat Mitzvah, baby naming, or wedding, etc.).

Of course, you can always purchase the food, bring it to the synagogue and do the set up yourself while also following the synagogue's Kashrut guidelines. Some assistance may be available on the day of your Kiddush.
